

## FT. SHERIDAN HORSE SHOW JULY 18-19

### Annual Affair in Benefit of Post Activities; Features and Patroness List

The sixth annual show of the Fort Sheridan Horse Show association will be held Friday and Saturday, July 18 and 19, in the outdoor ring at the Fort, with two performances daily, at 9:30 a. m. and 1:00 p. m. The show is given as a benefit affair for the Post educational, religious, charitable and recreational activities.

Brigadier General C. H. Conrad, Jr., is president of the association; Capt. James S. Rodwell, 13th Cavalry, executive; Capt. Charles W. Fake, 14th Cavalry, secretary, and Lieut. John F. Connell, F.D., is treasurer.

Two hundred entries are expected in the 35 classes, which include 7 military, 9 hunters, 5 jumpers, 7 saddle, 3 polo and 4 children's. The prizes in plate and cash are valued at \$3,000.

#### Feature Attraction

The featured attraction will be the U. S. Army Olympic Horse Show team; Major H. D. Chamberlain and Lieuts. Gordon Rogers and Earl Thompson, in riding and jumping exhibitions, showing 12 internationally known horses.

Outstanding classes are: Olympic Jump; Fort Sheridan Officers' Club Challenge cup; and the 1930 Grand Hunter championship of the North Shore Horse Show circuit open to the Blue Ribbon winners of the 1930 shows at the South Shore Country club, Lake Forest, Oconomowoc, Wheaton, Milwaukee, and Fort Sheridan.

### Estimating Radiation Volume Scientifically

Guessing at the amount of radiation required in a room and the proper size of the boiler necessary to carry this amount of radiation has been eliminated from the radiator heating industry by the compilation and adoption of standards for certified heating

installation, according to a writer in the current issue of the American Builder.

Instead of guessing at the amount of radiation, a heating contractor now may turn to the standard radiation tables and here he will find the amount of radiation necessary to balance the heat loss through cracks in the room.

This method is as rapid of application as any of the rule of thumb methods and has the advantage of being a truly scientific means of ar-

iving at the quantities of radiation needed. The B. T. U., or British Thermal Unit is used for figuring heating quantities.
