F. L. CHENEY DIES; FORMER COUNCILMAN

City Commissioner 8 Years and Candidate for Mayor in 1927; Career

Frank L. Cheney, 60, resident of Highland Park for 24 years, city commissioner for eight years and candidate for mayor three years ago, died Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, in the Highland Park hospital, following a serious surgical operation performed Monday night. He was taken ill Thursday of last week and was removed to the hospital from his home, 1006 North Sheridan road, on Monday.

Mr. Cheney was one of Highland Park's best known and most public spirited citizens, and gave largely of his time and talents for the service of the city for years. He was the first president of the Highland Park Community Service, former president of Briergate Golf club, served on the public utility franchise committee appointed by the city council in 1916, was elected commissioner in 1919 and served four years in charge of streets and public improvements.

Eight Years on Council

In 1923 he was re-elected commissioner and served as vice-president of the city council and in charge of accounts and finances of the city. In the spring of 1927 he was candidate Community Day July 4 for mayor to succeed Mayor Samuel M. Hastings and was defeated by Benjamin F. Lewis, the present mayor.


