

WOMEN ON JURIES IS OBJECT OF CAMPAIGN

H. P. Women Voters League Plans for Drive to Interest Public in Referendum

At a recent board meeting of the Highland Park League of Women Voters, held at the home of Mrs. Constant Hopkins, president, plans were discussed for the women-on-juries campaign which is to be in charge of Mrs. Raymond Simons, chairman of Legal Status of Women.

At the November elections voters of the state will decide by referendum whether or not women shall serve on juries in Illinois. They are already serving successfully in twenty-one other states. Judge George W. Sample of Ann Arbor, Mich., says:

Bring Valuable Asset

"Women bring to the jury a quality that is one of the most valuable assets in jury service. They bring honesty and a sense of fair dealing among men, a sense of the majesty of the law properly tempered with mercy. They bring vigor and are averse to the delays that are so many times attributed to strictly men juries. I never feel as secure about the result of the work of a jury as I do when it contains a percentage of women jurors, and I would not think of dispensing with the services of women on juries but would consider it a distinct step backward."

The following interesting comment

is made by Judge George Buck of San Mateo, Calif.

Make Intelligent Jurors

"They make as intelligent jurors as men, rather better, as they pay more strict attention and preserve better order. The objection to women on juries are that there are many cases dealing with sex relations of which respectable women should not hear or know. This is nonsense. If such things exist respectable women should hear of them, judge of the guilt or innocence of the parties, and then go out into the world to better conditions and prevent like cases. It is high time women took a hand in this aspect of society. There is always a strong objection to women as jurors on the part of evil-doers and all who aid and abet them."

BATHING BEACHES POPULAR JUST NOW

Attendance Increases as Temperature of Water Rises; Swimming Class

The attendance at Central bathing beach has increased greatly in the last few days because of the higher temperature of the water. The water is at 62 degrees now, a rise of six degrees having taken place since a week ago. The beach is in good shape, with about 75 to 100 feet of good sand and a graduating depth. The equipment is all complete, with swings, see-saws and parallel bars. A refreshment stand is at the entrance and serves cool drinks, ice cream, etc. According to Bill Rice, the life guard at the beach, there were about 150 to 200 people at Central on Monday. There were a number of out-of-town bathers, coming from Chicago and the smaller towns to the west of Highland Park.

Swimming Classes

On Monday, June 30, Mr. Rice is starting a beginning swimming class for all those interested. There will be no charge, and Mr. Rice is capable of giving very excellent instruction.

For the benefit of those who do not know, the residents of Highland Park are asked to obtain season tickets for the privilege of using the three beaches; these are Roger Williams avenue, Central avenue, and Park avenue. For persons between twelve and sixteen years of age the tickets are ten cents; from 16-21 they are twenty-five cents, and for those over 21 they are fifty cents. These tickets are obtainable at the beaches or at the Park board office.
