### Mayor B. F. Lewis Makes An Appeal to Citizens to Get More Gas Tax Money

The following letter from Mayor B. F. Lewis to A. W. Vercoe, president of the North Shore Trust Co. and chairman of the finance committee of the county board, is self-explanatory.

In backing up the mayor's appeal the Press would like to urge every citizen to buy their gasoline in Lake county, as all of the gas tax money must be spent on the roads, and the more money spent in Lake county, the more our percentage of the gas tax money will be.

I wonder if the county officials have done anything with the newspaper within Lake county, urging the people to purchase their gasoline at some point within Lake county. If no thought has been given to it, just wanted to suggest that some one on the county board approach both of the newspapers in Highland Park, and other members approach newspapers in their respective communities, to appeal to the people, not only at present, but at more or less regular intervals, to make their purchases of gasoline within the county.

### England Returns U. S. Documents Taken During The Revolutionary War

England's gift to the United States of more than 20,000 documents taken away when the British army retreated after the Revolution, has been received just in time to make the 4th of July the occasion for better feeling between the two countries.

The return of the papers was proposed as an evidence of friendship following the visit of Ramsey MacDonald to President Hoover. Among them is the official declaration of war covering eight pages in the handwriting of John Hancock. There are 69 letters written by George Washington to the British commanders, 36 letters to Lord Cornwallis about his defeat and surrender at Yorktown and a number of letters written by American loyalists who sympathized with the British throughout the seven-year struggle.

The return of the papers show that jingoism and crass prejudice are nearly gone now. Sympathy and mutual respect thrive. Conflict between the countries is now not only unthinkable, but nearly impossible."
