England's gift to the United State of more than 20,000 documents taker Sister Agnes Louise who has been away when the British army retreat ed after the Revolution, has been re ceived just in time to make the 4tl of July the occasion for better feeling between the two countries.

The return of the papers was pro posed as an evidence of friendship following the visit of Ramsey Mac Donald to President Hoover. Among them is the official declaration of war covering eight pages in the hand writing of John Hancock. There ar 69 letters written by George Wash ington to the British commanders 36 letters to Lord Cornwallis abou his defeat and surrender at York by American loyalists who sympa thized with the British throughou
