

### Monday Hottest Day in Two Years; Storm Damage at Kenosha

Lake county suffered through the warmest day in more than two years Monday, the mercury soaring to the record height of 98 degrees for June, according to John O. Laux, Waukegan government weather observer.

Thousands suffered as the mercury continued to rise in the tube throughout the afternoon and early part of the evening. The beaches attracted thousands, while those who had automobiles drove to lakes in the county in a vain attempt to escape the heat.

#### Rain Brings Relief

The cooling showers and fresh breezes that came with the storm in the evening brought relief to the thousands of sufferers from the overwhelming heat wave which was felt the more severely because it followed a period of comparatively cool weather.

#### Storm at Kenosha

A terrific windstorm, which tore through Kenosha county, from the state line to Kenosha, damaging property and tearing down light and telephone connections, seemed to miss Lake county by a margin of feet rather than miles Monday night.

The storm continued for several hours and then quieted, leaving flapping shingles and tangled wires in its wake. All roadhouses and gas stations along the state highway were dark and telephone communication impossible until daylight.

Mrs. John Mielke of Kenosha was bruised and cut about the face and head when a tree, torn up by the storm, crashed across the car in which she was riding with her husband.

Congress has passed a resolution discarding the use of dial telephones in the capital. But the wire pulling will go on just the same.
