

Hudson-Essex Makes Economy Test With Hudson Great Eight

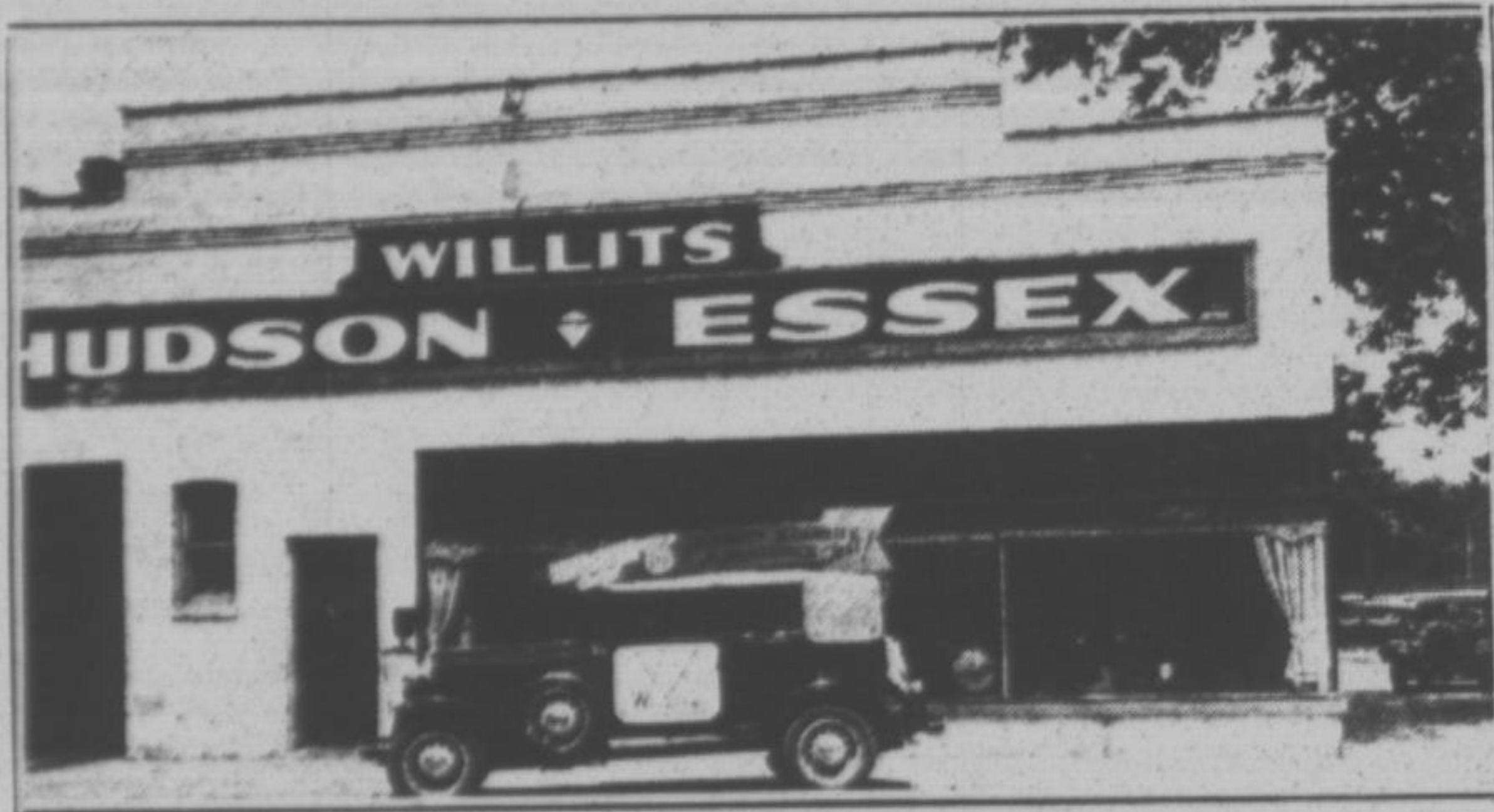

In a notable efficiency-economy tests conducted by Willits Hudson-Essex last Thursday and Friday the remarkable mileage obtained with a new convertible coach eight-cylinder Hudson, the Hudson Great-Eight model, is especially worthy of record.

In preparation for the test a glass jug of gasoline was fixed on a small bracket in front of the radiator with a small brass pipe connection with the carburetor, so that the gasoline could be seen diminishing as the test progressed. Five persons were in the car, including Mr. Willits of Willits Hudson-Essex, Lew Bishop, representing the Lloyd Hollister, Inc., newspapers of Wilmette,

Winnetka and Glencoe, and Paul Udell, representing the Udell publications on the test trip in which 21.1 miles was the distance covered on a gallon of gas. The record of the tests made Thursday and Friday of last week is as follows:

Thursday, June 19, three tests, with Ethyl gasoline—First test, 19.1 miles per gallon; second test, 19.3 miles; third test, 20.9 miles.

Friday, June 20, two tests with ordinary gasoline—First test, 20.8 miles per gallon; second test, 21.1 miles per gallon.

This seems to demonstrate that the new Great Eight Hudson is by no means a "gas eater."

Award Parents \$3,000 Damages in Death of Girl Killed in H. P.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hulsey, parents of Mildred Louise Hulsey, the four-year-old girl who was killed last year by an automobile near her home at Highland Park, were granted \$3,000 by a jury in Judge Edward D. Shurtleff's court Tuesday in their \$10,000 damage suit against the North Shore Restaurant company, Peter Theodos and George Biovitt, employees of the company.

Little Mildred was playing with other children in the alley near her home on May 4, 1929, when a car owned by the restaurant company struck her. The child died from the injuries she received in the accident. The restaurant was in the storeroom now occupied by the Walgren Drug Co.

H. P. YOUNG MAN IS KILLED IN ACCIDENT

Antonio Lencioni, Son of Charles Dies from Injuries; Funeral Held Monday

Antonio Lencioni, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lencioni, 933 Waukegan avenue, Highland Park, died at 3 o'clock Saturday morning, from injuries received in an auto accident about 7:30 Friday evening, at the intersection of St. Johns avenue and Moraine road, when a car in which he was riding, driven by Lawrence Van Blarison of this city, aged 21, struck an auto driven by Bernard J. Lutz of Chicago. Betty Thomas and Wayman Geist, relatives of Lutz, who were with him were slightly injured.

According to testimony of Lutz and Miss Thomas, Van Blarison's Ford was going about 35 or 40 miles an hour and had failed to stop at Moraine road. It struck the Lutz car and glanced off into the ditch, hurling both the young men out. Lencioni's skull was fractured. Van Blarison suffered severe injuries and for a time his condition was grave, but yesterday it was reported that he was improving in the Highland Park hospital. Coroner Taylor after impaneling a jury Saturday and hearing some testimony, continued the inquiry until Van Blarison is able to testify.

Antonio Lencioni was a young man well and favorably known about the community. He graduated from Elm Place school and has been employed about town for several years. Recently he was learning the trade of a painter. He had many friends whose sincere sympathy is extended the relatives at this time.

Besides the parents there are living three brothers and one sister, Peter, Julius and Fernando Lencioni, and Mrs. Jennie Inman, all of this city.

The funeral service was held at 9:30 Monday morning at St. James church, Highwood, and burial was in the Holy Saints cemetery, near Des Plaines.
