

### Endurance Flight at Sky Harbor Continues; Thousands Visit Field

The Hunter Brothers, endurance flyers at Sky Harbor, who last Sunday morning passed the previous record of 420 hours and 21 minutes in the air, were still aloft in their airplane, City of Chicago, late yesterday afternoon, with indications that unless something unforeseen should happen, they would be able to complete 500 hours in the air at least.

John and Kenneth Hunter are manipulating the plane, and their brothers, Walter and Albert Hunter, operate the refueling ship, while their sister, Irene Hunter, prepares food for the flyers. The quintet hail from Sparta, a little mining town in southern Illinois.

Since Saturday huge crowds have been visiting the airport daily, many remaining until late at night, and the exploits of the intrepid flyers have become news of world-wide interest. Kingsford-Smith and his crew who recently successfully flew across the Atlantic from Ireland to Newfoundland, were expected to visit Sky Harbor on Wednesday, according to previous announcement. Many people from Highland Park, Lake Forest and other north shore towns have visited the field this week.

Tuesday about noon the Hunter Bros. in the plane broadcasted over the radio by means of a microphone let down from a National Air Transport plane equipped with receiving

and sending sets. This is the first time that this feat has been accomplished, so that not only new aviation history but also new radio history is being made at Sky Harbor during this endurance flight.

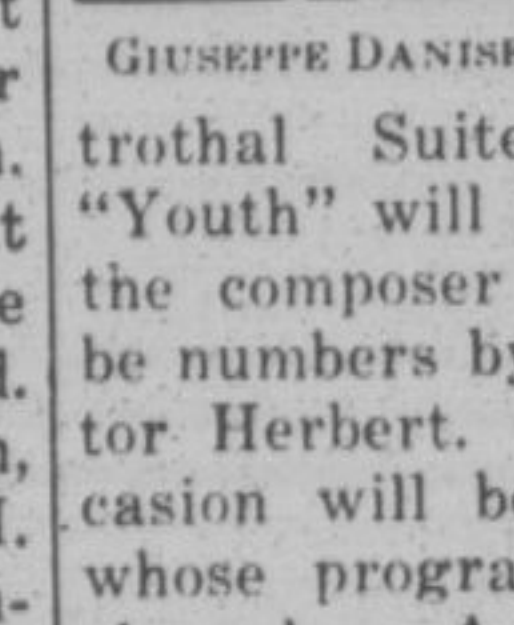

### Sunday Afternoon Concert

The third week of the season of 1930 season will begin on Sunday afternoon, July 6, and although Independence Day comes two days earlier, it is good to know that the Sunday afternoon concert by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Eric DeLamarter will be entirely American in scope as far as

the orchestra numbers are concerned. Rossetter G. Cole and Deems Taylor will both be represented, and one of the high spots of the afternoon will be Mr. DeLamarter's own composition, "The Betrothal Suite." Felix Borowski's "Youth" will be likewise played with the composer conducting. There will be numbers by Leo Sowerby and Victor Herbert. The soloist on this occasion will be Joseph Vito, harpist, whose program, although not to be classed as American, shows splendid choice. He is to play Bellota's "Impromptu," Liszt's "Liebestraum" and the "Valse de Concert" by Louis Haselmans, one of the principal conductors of Ravinia opera. There is no charge for reserved seats at these Sunday concerts, the general admission at the gate covering everything.

Sunday night, the season's first performance of Giordano's great dramatic opera "Andrea Chenier" will be given. This work has long been a favorite among Ravinia patrons particularly in view of the fact that Mme. Elisabeth Rethberg sings the role of Maddalena, its heroine, while Giovanni Martinelli is cast as the poet Chenier. Giuseppe Danise likewise has an outstanding role in this work, being Gerrard, the revolutionary. "Andrea Chenier" offers superb opportunity to all its principals for unusual singing and acting for it is highly dramatic in its every scene and its composer, Giordano, has admirably caught the colorful spirit of the French Revolution. Others in the large cast are Mme. Bourskaya, who will be cast as Madelon, Desire DeFrere, Ada Paggi, George Cehanovsky, Louis D'Angelo, Marek Windheim, Lodovico Oliviero, and Paolo Ananian.
