The Saints were unable to tally until the fifth when one run was pushed over and in the eighth three more crossed home plate to knot the count. THIRD WEEK'S BILL OF RAVINIA OPERA

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will be the offering with Mme. Yvonne Gall in the title role. It will be remembered that this work was introduced into the Ravinia repertoire at the time Mme. Gall was first brought here from Paris as a member of the Ravinia coterie. She had long been famous in this part in the Parisian opera houses, where she had been trained in those traditions which have governed this opera since the days of its world premiere. Giuseppe Danise will have the role of Athanael, for "Thais" is a work in which the principal masculine role is assigned to a baritone. Giuseppe Cavadore, one of the Ravinia newcomers will be cast as Niceas. Others in the cast are Miss Maxwell, Miss Paggi, Miss Falco, Mr. D'Angelo, Mr. Cehanovsky, Mr. Hasselmans will conduct.

The repertoire will assume a lighter aspect on Tuesday night, July 8, at which Plotow's tuneful opera "Martha" will be presented for the first time this season. There is none of the operas still current in which the melody is more pronounced than in this universal favorite, nor is there an opera more replete in the spirit of fun. There is a splendid cast available for its performance at Ravinia and Miss Florence Macbeth will have the title role. Mario Chamlee will appear opposite her as Lionel, this being a part which gives him full opportunity to display the lyric sweetness of his voice. Mme. Ina Bourskaya will be Nancy and Virgilio Lazzari will be the rough but kindly Plunkett. Vittorio Trevisan will be Sir Tristan and Louis D'Angelo will be cast as the bibulous sheriff. Louis Hasselmans will conduct.

"La Boheme"

"La Boheme," long a favorite among the works of Giacomo Puccini, is scheduled for performance on Wednesday night, July 9. Adapted from Murger's celebrated Parisian stories "La Vie de Boheme" which reflect the colorful life as it was once lived in the Latin Quarter of Paris, this work teems with romance which is unfolded through the medium of melody and action as Puccini could combine these two elements. "La Boheme" is noted for its beautiful arias, its duets and its choruses. Miss Queena Mario will be cast as Mimi, the flower girl, while opposite her, Armand Tokatyan will sing the role of Rodolfo, the poet-lover. Miss Margery Maxwell will be the vivacious Musette and Mario Basiola, Desire Defrere and Virgilio Lazzari will form the trio of Bohemians. Paolo Ananian will have the two character roles. Gennaro Papi will conduct.

The usual children's concert will be given on Thursday afternoon, July 10, the program being presented by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Eric DeLamar. The entertainment which is to follow the concert will be presented by Billy de Lisle who will appear in "Keeping Busy" and also Shannon's "Play Time Frolics." Children twelve years of age and under are admitted free to these concerts. Seats in the opera house are free for everyone.

Thursday "La Juive"

Thursday night, July 10th, "La Juive" Halevy's colorful opera will be the offering, this being the first time

this season this dramatic work has been brought to performance. This is one of the most melodious of all the French operas and is a favorite vehicle for Mme. Elisabeth Rethberg who will sing the dramatic role of Rachel, and of Giovanni Martinelli who will be cast in the equally dramatic part of Eleazar. Leon Rothier will have one of his greatest parts as the Cardinal. Miss Florence Macbeth will be the Princess and Giuseppe Cavadore will be Leopold. George Cehanovsky and Paolo Ananian will complete the cast. There will be ballet, in which Ruth Page and Blake Scott will be featured, and Louis Hasselmans will conduct.

"La Rondine" is to be repeated on Friday night, July 11, the same public enthusiasm having been aroused over this work this year as was accorded it last. Here is another Puccini opera which still holds its place as a novelty in view of the fact that it was held at Ravinia for the first time last season, but which will undoubtedly be included in the repertoire for many seasons to come. It is an outstanding vehicle for Mme. Lucrezia Bori who will again sing the title role, with Edward Johnson cast as Ruggero. Miss Macbeth will be Lizette and Armand Tokatyan, Prunier. Others in the cast are Miss Maxwell, Miss Paggi, Miss Falco, Mr. Windheim, Mr. Cehanovsky, Mr. D'Angelo, Mr. Ananian. The ballet will be a special feature with Miss Page and Mr. Scott. Mr. Papi will conduct.

Saturday night, July 12, Verdi's "The Masked Ball," which for the last five seasons has been a favorite with Ravinia audiences will be given. This is one of the few operas having America as its locale, and true to the Verdi tradition it is filled with melody and dramatic action. Mme. Rethberg will be cast as the heroine of this work with Giovanni Martinelli in the principal tenor part. These roles provide Mme. Rethberg and Mr. Martinelli with every opportunity for singing and acting. Giuseppe Danise has an outstanding role in this work, in which his bel canto voice is used to full advantage. Miss Florence Macbeth will have a charming role as Oscar and Julia Claussen will be Ulrica. Others in the cast are Mr. Lazzari, Mr. D'Angelo, Mr. Oliviero and Mr. Cehanovsky. Mr. Papi will conduct.

West Point Preparatory School at Fort Sheridan

The seventh successive Sixth Corps Area West Point Preparatory School will open at Ft. Sheridan September 15 next, in order to prepare candidates for admission to the Military Academy at West Point. It is open to all enlisted men of the Regular Army in this Corps Area who are high school graduates (or who have equivalent education); who are between 19 and 21 years of age; who, by July 1, 1931, will have one year's service in the Regular Army; who, by July 1, 1931, will not be 22 years of age; and who can pass a rigid physical examination and a qualifying mental test. Last year six men from Ft. Sheridan attended, one of whom is being admitted as a cadet this year.
