Plan Water Carnival, Roger Williams Beach Saturday, 4:00 P. M.

Definite plans have been made for the water carnival to be held at Roger Williams bathing beach next Saturday. The activities will begin at four o'clock, and will continue until dark.

There will be swimming races run off at 4:00. These will include 25 yard races for children under 12, and 50 yard free style races for all those interested. At five there will be junior horseshoe pitching tournaments, and the senior horseshoe pitching will be held at seven. Supper will be eaten on the beach by all those who bring their own meal, and after supper there will be entertainments of various sorts, including pillow fighting on a greased pole, diving, exhibition swimming, and decorated canoes parading before the crowd. Canoe tilting will also be featured.

No Council Meeting Is Held This Week

No meeting of the city council was held Monday evening and the next regular meeting probably will be held at the city hall Monday evening of next week.

Plans for Yacht Club And Big Clubhouse on Beach Are Discussed

Highland Park promoters of a plan to build a yacht harbor and club house here are enthusiastically proceeding with their campaign, and indications at a meeting held Tuesday evening were that interest in the project was likely to grow rapidly.

It was decided to write the city council a letter to inquire the method to be adopted to secure land for a club house, the plan being to erect a building to cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000. It was suggested by some members of the Highland Park club that this club might be induced to merge with the new organization when formed to make one large club. The idea is to secure a 99-year lease on a site and erect an adequate club house as soon as possible.

In the matter of the harbor for 200 boats, it is believed that the best location is just outside the city waterworks plant and the bathing beach, and the consent of property owners along the lake is required by the government in such instances, it is pointed out.

The committee plans to secure as complete a mailing list as possible of owners of lake shore property and of boats large enough to require government licenses and to write them with a view to interesting them in the project.

Weston E. Davie is chairman of the committee and the other members are Commissioner Lyle Gourley, Albert P. Snite, Dr. Harry Gradle, Eldridge Hamlin, X. Vigeant, Frank Chaffey, and Gus Treloar. Another meeting will be held in about a week, it is expected.

McCrystle Hotel Case Is Carried to Circuit Court; Long Fight Seen

Another step in the fight of Mrs. May McCrystle for permit to erect a hotel on her property on East Central avenue, in this city, was taken Monday, when her attorney, William Behanna of Waukegan, filed in the circuit court a writ of certiorari which attacks the powers of the zoning board of appeals and the city ordinance which created it, branding the latter as illegal. Prolonged litigation is expected as a result of this action.

The Highland Park zoning board of appeals refused to grant Mrs. McCrystle permission to erect a hotel building on Central avenue, adjoining the Highland Park business district.

Since the property adjoins the business district, Mrs. McCrystle maintains that it is suitable only for business purposes.

Attorney Behanna, in his petition for a writ, stated that in former Highland Park zoning ordinances the McCrystle property was given a business classification.

The property has been used for business purposes for a number of years and at present is being used as a hotel, according to Behanna.
