On account of the women-on-juries campaign which is being conducted by the Illinois League of Women Voters, the board of the Highland Park league will hold meetings during the summer. These will be on the third Wednesday of the month at the home of the president, Mrs. Constant Hopkins.

The women-on-juries referendum comes up for vote at the general election November 4th. Illinois needs the service of women on juries because:

"A jury should represent a cross-section of the community. No cross-section of the community is complete without women.

"Women as citizens and electors can and should perform this citizen's duty and take their share of the responsibility in the administration of justice.

"There are many cases in which young girls and women must appear before grand juries and in our criminal courts. These unfortunates, who many times are in no way responsible
