## W.C.T.U. Convinced Drinking at Colleges Is Greatly Reduced

The W. C. T. U. wrote to the leading college president asking them their opinion of the recent charges that drinking conditions are bad at colleges and received overwhelming assurance that student sobriety is the rule and that college conditions are thoroughly safe.

At the time this statement is made 246 college presidents have replied. Of these, 140 say there is less drinking than before prohibition; 44 say there is no drinking at their colleges; 46 say that there is not now and never was any but the most casual drinking among their students and that it is out of line with their college custom and tradition; 6 say there is not much change as to drinking since prohibition; 7 say conditions are bad and only 3 say that there is more drinking than there was before prohibition.

Almost every state university president declares there is less drinking than ever; and the great mass of testimony from the colleges with strong moral and church background is reassuring to the most exacting parents. From the few colleges which admit there is student drinking the presidents who replied to the W. C. T. U. questionnaire indicate that there is less drinking than there was prior to prohibition.

Blame for student drinking is placed squarely on the shoulders of parents and the older generation by several of the best known college presidents. Out of 246 letters from college presidents not more than three indicate that students drink because of prohibition.

## Attend Mystic Workers Convention this Week

The Mystic Workers, a fraternal beneficiary society, with headquarters at Fulton, Ill., will hold its fifth annual Juvenile Convention in the Coliseum at Fulton on July 8, 9, and 10.

Boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 18, who are members of the Mystic Workers local Juvenile lodges, will attend as delegates, having been elected from the membership in their local lodge.

Over 500, coming from all states in the Union in which the Mystic Workers transact business, have made reservations and qualified as official representatives to the Fulton convention.

The Mystic Workers was the first fraternal benefit society to hold a National Juvenile convention. The boys and girls attending are accompanied by adult superintendents acting as guides and chaperones for the children attending the convention.
