

### Letter From Plane Lost 6 Months Ago

A letter from the mail pouch carried by the ill-fated airship of the Western Air Express company which was lost on January 10, was delivered last week to Irving Townsend, 315 North Utica street, Waukegan.

The lost airship was found two weeks ago in the Wasatch mountains of Utah by two shearers, who notified the postal authorities. No trace of the pilot has yet been found.

The letter received by Mr. Townsend was postmarked "Los Angeles, Calif., 12 m., Jan. 10." It bore stamped notification that delivery was late due to the wreck of the airplane on that date.

### Plan All-Veterans Day at State Fair Aug. 16

All Veterans' Day, the opening feature of the Illinois State Fair, Saturday, Aug. 16, is established as a mark of recognition, on the part of the state administration, for the men who have served in all the wars in which our nation has engaged. Three thousand dollars in awards will be distributed to the winners in the band contests, drill team and drum and bugle corps competitions. To infuse comedy in the entertainment, the program calls for the competitive appearance of "clown bands" and offers three cash prizes—\$100, \$50 and \$25. Daylight fireworks will be set off at intervals and for the evening the most pretentious fireworks program that has ever been presented in Illinois is promised.

Meter Semon, farmer living near Zion, last week was awarded damages of \$2,000 by a circuit court jury for a grass fire that burned his buildings. Andrew Lund, blamed for the fire by Semon, was ordered to pay the damages.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PARAGRAPH (a) OF SECTION 5 OF AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE CONSTRUCTION AND USE OF OIL-BURNING EQUIPMENT AND THE STORAGE AND USE OF OIL FUELS USED THEREIN."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION 1. That paragraph (a) of Section 5 of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance regulating the construction and use of oil-burning equipment and the storage and use of oil fuels used therein" be and the same is hereby amended so that it shall hereafter be, and read as follows:

(a) GRAVITY FEED—WHEN PERMITTED. Gravity feed to fuel oil burners may be from a tank or tanks having a total capacity of not to exceed 275 gallons, provided that the burner to which the oil is fed is equipped with an automatic safeguard approved by the Fire Marshal and Building Inspector, which will prevent the abnormal discharge of oil at the burner. Except as permitted in this section, no tanks, drums, nor other containers inside a building, or discharging inside a building, shall be provided with a faucet or other bottom-drawing device which will permit the gravity flow of liquids inside the building. Pipes shall not terminate at any point lower than the level of the source of supply.

SECTION 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication according to law.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS: Sealed proposals subject to conditions contained herein and covering all labor and material to construct the above mentioned building as called for in the several divisions of the work as follows: Masonry, Concrete, Facing Stone, Structural and Ornamental Iron, Carpentry, Lathing and Plastering; Slate and Composition Roofing and Sheet Metal, Painting, Glazing, Linoleum, Window Shades, Furniture, Heating and Ventilating, Plumbing and Gasfitting, Electric Wiring and Fixtures, Book Stacks, and Elevator, will be received by the Library Board and will be opened by the Library Board at its meeting on Tuesday, July 21, 1930, at 7:00 p.m.

Bids will be considered only from individuals, firms or corporations possessing satisfactory financial and technical ability, equipment, and organization to insure speedy completion of contract.

In making awards the records of bidders for expedition and satisfactory performance on contracts of similar character and magnitude shall be carefully considered.

At the discretion of the architects or the library board drawings and specifications may be obtained by application to the architects, Holmes & Flinn, and by making with them a deposit of a certified check payable to Holmes & Flinn in the sum of \$10.00 for each set of plans, as security for the safe return of the plans and specifications within ten days of the opening bids.

Proposals to be considered by the owner shall be made on bid forms supplied by the architects, and each proposal shall be accompanied by a certified check amounting to five per cent (5%) of the amount of the bid in each instance. The successful bidder will be required to give a surety bond in the full amount of the contract.
