

PARK PLAYGROUNDS ACTIVITIES MANY

Children Taken to Visit Planetarium and Sox Park; Other Doings of Week

On Wednesday, July 9, fifty-eight children of the Highland Park playgrounds were taken to Chicago to visit the Adler Planetarium and the Sox park. They left Highland Park at nine, accompanied by five instructors, and traveled to Chicago in two busses. At eleven they heard the lecture and saw the interesting astronomical demonstrations at the planetarium. After the children had eaten their lunches, they were taken for a ride through the south parks. At 2:30 sharp they were at the gates of the White Sox ball park, waiting eagerly for the first home run. There weren't any home runs, and the Sox lost the game, but it was generally felt that the day was successful.

Park League Game

In the first league game played between the boys of Ravinia and Sunset playgrounds the Sunset park team lost to Ravinia, 2-0. It was a well-played game, and at no time was there anything sure about the outcome. The game was played at Sunset park. As the season continues there will be a game played each week, and it is hoped that there will be another team formed either at Sunset park or at Ravinia, so that there can be two games a week. The games are generally played on Wednesday.

James Butterworth Wins Championship

James Butterworth of West Park avenue was the winner of the "Illinois State Metallic Light 200 yard championship," held at Fort Sheridan Sunday, July 13 with a score of 189x200 for 20 shots, he also placed third in "The Telescopic Light 200 yard championship."

James also broke the "National Record for "Metallic sight shooting" by placing 10 consecutive shots in a 5/8 inch circle. Previous record was 10 shots in 9/10 inch circle.

He won the "Indoor State Championship" held in February and has now won 49 medals for shooting.

Speed Laws Are Being Enforced at the Fort

Strict enforcement of the state speed laws within the boundaries of Fort Sheridan over the week-end resulted in the arrest of eleven motorists, it was learned today, and subsequent arraignment in a Highwood justice of the peace court.

Four enlisted men have been assigned to motorcycle patrol duty by officers of the military post, in an effort to prevent or at least cut down the number of accidents on the government property.

Previous to last week, only one military police was doing traffic supervision work at the Fort.

North Shore motorists are asked to co-operate with Fort Sheridan officers in seeing that the speed laws are obeyed. Signs have been put up, it is understood, giving the various speeds permissible, 25 miles an hour in the outlying parts of the post and 20 miles an hour in the vicinity of the barracks.

Widow and Daughter Get Estate of L. L. Winters

Mrs. Frances P. Winters of Highland Park and her daughter, Theodora Perry Winters, are named as the principal beneficiaries in the estate of \$197,707.02 left by the late Leander L. Winters, according to the appraiser's report filed this week with County Clerk Lew A. Hendee, according to reports in Waukegan newspapers.

Mr. Winters, who died on February 24, 1930 named the Chicago Title and Trust company as executor in his will. He also specified that his mother was to receive \$25 a month for the remainder of her life.

COACH PEEL WRITES ON SWIMMING TOPIC

Discusses Importance of Correct Methods in Learning; Tells How to Do It

The following on the importance of correct swimming" is written by Coach J. A. Peel, of Deerfield-Shields high school:

To those who cannot swim, swimming is often considered the ability to keep the head above the water surface by some action of the arms and legs. Making progress in the water by a "hashed up" arm and leg action is not swimming any more than pounding out a raw tune with one finger is playing a piano.

Swimming has infinite possibilities in the varieties of exercise and recreation which can be attained by practice. The best practice has determined what constitutes correctness in swimming strokes and every human should be able to swim at least one stroke correctly.

Only in very late years has swimming been considered of enough importance to warrant an important part in physical education. Class instruction in swimming has now been introduced successfully and with its development swimming has moved more and more to the front as important in recreation, physical development, and training.

Grade School Subject

Learning to swim is a grade school subject. In the future, swimming will be considered essential in the education of every pupil in the grades. It is at that age that the child is fearless and eager for new sensations. This makes the mastery of a swimming stroke a lighter task. High schools, colleges and universities will have the duty of perfecting the strokes and developing a broader knowledge of the sport
