

C. M. T. C. TO START AT FORT JULY 31ST

Annual Summer Training Course With 2,100 Youths Enrolled; Details

On Thursday, July 31, the Citizens' Military Training camp at Fort Sheridan will open, with 2,100 youths from all parts of Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan enrolled. It is the sixth annual summer training camp held at Fort Sheridan and it will continue until August 29.

This year, following the custom of past years, the camp itself and the various camp streets will be named in honor of officers who were killed in action overseas during the World war. The camp will be known officially as Camp Donald W. White, in memory of Lieutenant White who was killed near Landres at St. George, France, on November 1, 1918, while leading his platoon of Co. L, 23rd Infantry. For this act, Lieutenant White received the Distinguished Service Cross, the highest award next to the Medal of Honor which our Government awards for deeds of valor.

Names of Streets

The other camp streets have been named in honor of Lieutenants Anderson, Arends, Betts, Black, Blocher, Blum, Clarke, Dennen, Fenelon, Ferris, Goodfellow and Hall, all of whom were either killed in action overseas

or died of wounds received in action. There is a picture of each officer concerned, with a brief history of his career, at either end of the company street named for the particular officer.

The camp has been entirely renovated and all company streets, mess halls, and bath houses have been put in the best possible condition. Nothing has been left undone to make things pleasant and comfortable for the boys when they arrive. There will be nine organizations, six rifle companies, a machine gun company, and two cavalry troops.

Course of Training

Their training, as usual, will consist of a happy mixture of light military training in the morning and physical training in the afternoon. Military training will involve chiefly the fundamentals of disciplinary drills, some rifle marksmanship, first aid, military courtesy, citizenship, a short overnight practice march, and the like. Physical training, in addition to the customary setting-up exercises, will consist of daily instruction and training in practically all sports, including baseball, both indoor and out, soccer, volleyball, football, track, golf, tennis, and swimming. All training, both military and physical, will be under the expert supervision of Regular Army Officers and enlisted men.

Ravinia Tennis Club Activities; Finish in Association Matches

This is the first year Ravinia has taken part in these matches and the club has made a very creditable appearance against such other teams as Evanston Country club, Chicago Town and Tennis.

Everyone who has played on the Ravinia courts this year say that they are the best kept and fastest courts on the North Shore.

The club expects to arrange for a showing of the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association show motion films of such stars as Tilden, Cochet, Williams, Patterson, etc., giving a chance for the study of various strokes, foot work and weight shifting.

The showing takes 100 minutes and will be made late in August at the Ravinia auditorium with an open invitation to all those in Highland Park interested in tennis to attend free.

For those who live in Ravinia and Highland Park for the summer months only there are several summer memberships still available. For permanent residents there are a few regular memberships available. For information call Mr. Kern, H. P. 4066, or write O. E. M. Keller, Ravinia.
