

ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CORPORATE PURPOSES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR FROM JUNE 1, 1930 TO MAY 31, 1931

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Highland Park East Park District, County of Lake and State of Illinois—

SECTION 1: That the following sums, or as much thereof as may be authorized by law, be and the same are hereby appropriated for corporate purposes for the fiscal year commencing June 1, 1930 and ending May 31, 1931.

Says Growth of Urban Population Is Aid to Spread of Epidemics

Commenting upon the fact revealed by the 1930 federal census that most of the population increase in Illinois took place in the cities, Dr. Andy Hall, state health director, warned, "Every increase in a city population makes more easily possible an explosive epidemic. Through public health departments cities have already demonstrated that almost perfect control over health matters may be experienced. The greater increase in city than in rural populations from births indicates an enormous improvement in the safety of city life. The strong continued flow of population toward the cities increases the demand for public health service for the protection of both the citizens and new comer."

Illinois Leads Nation in Public Recreation

Illinois led the nation last year in money spent for public recreation. The yearbook of the Playground and Recreation association reveals that this state out-distanced New York, its nearest competitor, by almost \$3,000,000. Illinois spent \$6,413,253. Some of the largest 1929 Illinois investments in recreation were East St. Louis, \$81,000; Evanston, \$93,274; Peoria, \$78,458; Rockford, \$79,592, and Springfield, \$69,126. Fifty-six Illinois towns and cities reported they maintained 1,891 public recreation areas under leadership. These figures placed the state third in the number of directed play areas maintained.
