Purchase Chlorinator

The contract for the chlorinator for the Carey avenue disposal plant, which has been in use on trial since July 3, was awarded to Wallace & Tiernan Co., the price being \$1,330.

Priester Construction Co. and the Henry Newgard Co., and the amounts were ordered paid.

Bills and payrolls for the period, June 1 to June 30, were presented and approved, the total being \$25,216.52.

Mayor Lewis appointed J. B. Garnett, Mrs. Otis L. Beardsley and Mrs. C. W. Balke members of the library board, and appointments were approved by the council. All three are re-appointments, as their terms have recently expired.

At the meeting of the board of local improvements a resolution calling for bids on the Taylor avenue paving job was adopted.
