

Deerfield Baseball Team Loses in Close Game to St. Anthony's

Peter Harder, star portsider flinger for Deerfield, and Vasilius, pitcher for the St. Anthony's team of Waukegan, engaged in a pitcher's duel Sunday afternoon at Deerfield, and when the final returns were recorded the Saints had chalked up a fine 1 to 0 victory over the Deerfield aggregation in 10 innings. It was a Tri-County league fray.

Harder's slants had the Saints baffled, while Vasilius was just as effective against the Deerfield crew. The former was nicked for five blows, while his team-mates were credited with seven. Kapter, Saints, center fielder, was the only player to pole out an extra base hit.

The Saints put over the one run in the tenth inning. Dickshot cracked out a single, stole second, and scored on another single by Bastye. It was by far the outstanding battle of the Tri-County league this year, and showed the prowess of the St. Anthony boys. Lineups:

DEFEAT DIVISION BENTON TOWNSHIP

County Board Votes Against Voliva's Plan to Make Zion Town Unit

Wilbur Glenn Voliva's attempt to separate Zion from the rest of Benton township was defeated, 18 to 15, last Thursday by vote of the county board of supervisors after they had listened to a bitter four-hour debate.

The defeat is the first that Voliva has suffered in many years of dealing with the county board of supervisors. It was regarded as a severe blow to Voliva's power and prestige.

Several hundred Zion residents jammed into the supervisor's room yesterday and frequently interrupted speeches with applause and boos.

Add Precinct
Benton Township, which escaped being divided into two political districts yesterday, was granted a seventh voting precinct by unanimous vote of the Lake County board of supervisors.

This is the second precinct added to Lake county in the last month; Shields Township, which includes Lake Bluff and Lake Forest, having been given an eighth precinct in June.

The new precinct takes in the community of Beach, located between Waukegan and Zion. The polling place will be located in the Beach school house and the judges of election will be Joseph Darrow, Charles Stickney and Eleanor Bales.

Sectional Air Derbies to Inaugurate National Air Races August 23

Washington, D. C. will be the starting point of the Eastern Women's Air Derby, which will inaugurate the National Air Races, to be held on the Curtiss-Wright-Reynolds airport at Chicago from August 23 to September 1, it was announced today jointly by Major R. W. Schroeder, contest director and Major Luke Christopher, secretary of the contest committee of the National Aeronautic association. Entries are limited to planes of 500 cubic inch piston displacement. From the National Capitol the girl flyers will wing southward to Atlanta, thence westward skirting the Gulf of Mexico and northward up the Mississippi River Valley.

Seattle, Washington, was named as the starting point for the Men's Western Derby, and Miami, Florida for the Eastern derby. Entries are limited to planes of 800 cubic inch piston displacement.

El Paso, Texas will be the take-off point from the Southwest for men flying planes of 500 cubic inch piston displacement, while Easterners flying planes in the same class will leave either from Hartford, Connecticut, or Boston, Massachusetts.

Los Angeles will be the starting point of the Non-stop derby, which will offer prizes totaling \$12,000.00. There are no limitations of power for that event.

The Women's Western derby for planes of 800 cubic inch piston displacement is farthest advanced in plans of any of the derbies. It will take off from Long Beach, California. Control points have been designated at San Diego, Phoenix, Tucson, Douglas, El Paso, Roswell, Lubbock, Amarillo, Wichita Kansas City St. Joseph, Des Moines, Madison, Elgin.

Final control points for derbies will be established at airports a short distance from Curtiss-Wright-Reynolds field. Elgin and Aurora already have been designated as such control points for the cross-country races and other nearby cities may be selected later. The reason for this is to permit the races to finish in their proper order. Hitherto the derby finishers have been strung out over a long period of time, and straggled in hap-hazard to the confusion of spectators. This year they will all cross the final finish line within the space of a few minutes in the order of their standing for the race.

Vice-President Curtis Visitor Here Saturday

Vice President Charles E. Curtis visited the Lake county home of Albert Lasker at Mill Road farm, in Lake Forest Saturday and attended the feature race at Arlington race track in the afternoon, to watch Gallant Fox, winner of the Derby and the Belmont stakes, win another great race.
