

WATER CARNIVAL AT BEACH NEXT SUNDAY

Famous Woman Diver to Be Chief Attraction; Other Events on Program

Next Sunday Highland Park swimming fans will find the Central avenue beach prepared for the biggest water carnival the city has ever seen. Preparations are in progress to make the afternoon one of gaiety and one that will insure everyone a surplus of fun and entertainment. Arraignments have been made to have a diving exhibition by Helen Wainwright, the foremost woman fancy diving expert in the country and twice a member of the United States Olympic team. Miss Wainwright will give her exhibition at 5:15 p. m. The other carnival events will begin at 3:30 p. m. and will continue until Miss Wainwright concludes her program. A special diving platform is being erected off the Central avenue beach for the occasion.

Miss Wainwright is said to be the best all around swimmer and diver of her time. Two times Olympic champion for fancy diving. Judges say she has a most perfect diving form. This appearance of Miss Wainwright is sponsored by the 3. V. D. Swim club which is sponsoring the National A. A. F. meet to be held in Lincoln Park Lagoon, August 28 and 29. Those entering this meet will be particularly interested in this diving contest Sunday. The public is cordially invited. The local carnival is held under the auspices of the East Park District.

The program for the carnival includes a number of new and novel events. The festivities will begin with a watermelon scramble in which a greased watermelon is thrown in the water to be obtained by whoever has the obstinacy to hold on to it. Another feature is the duck race, to be introduced to Highland Park for the first time. In this event a live duck is released, and all attempt to

Heat Records in Lake County Broken Sunday

Lake county's heat record was broken for the third consecutive day Sunday at 3 o'clock in the afternoon (2 p. m. sun time) when the thermometer of John Laux, local government observer, reached a height of 102 degrees. This topped the climax of Saturday when at the same time of the day a 101 and one-half temperature was recorded.

Until the week-end, a mark of 100 and one-quarter, set Friday afternoon, stood as a record in Waukegan. July 12 saw a 99 degree heat while a June record of 96 degrees was set on June 25.

"Never since the establishment of the government bureau here has such intense heat been recorded. Never before has any heat spell been so constant as it has during the past four days," Observer Laux said this morning.

Beach Popular Place During Heated Period

Hundreds of people from Highland Park and nearby towns gathered at the three public beaches during the broiling days of the last week-end to escape the torrid temperatures away from the lake. The waters of Lake Michigan offered stimulating relief, and most of the swimming fans came early in the morning and stayed till late at night.

While the thermometers registered from 100 to 105 in the shade, the water in the lake remained at approximately 68 degrees, and even those who did not go in the water enjoyed cooler breezes on the lake shore than those who sweltered above.

The refreshment stand at Central avenue beach was literally mobbed by crowds that sought added enjoyment in cooling drinks and ice cream. There were between 400 and 500 persons on the beach at the height of the day, and Park avenue sands were just as crowded. At Roger Williams avenue in Ravinia where the width of the beach does not permit so many there were about 250 people. Many at Central avenue brought their lunches and ate them in the shaded spots under the trees on the west side of the beach. The number of non-resident bathers far exceeded any number so far this year, and swarms of Highland Parkers could be seen from the northern to the southern limits of the city lake-front.

Girls Bowling Contest Next Tuesday at Park

The bowling green at Sunset park will be the scene next Tuesday afternoon of a girls' bowling tournament, to begin at 1:00 p. m. The girls from all playgrounds are asked to bring their lunches to Sunset park and stay for the tourney.
