North Chicago Bank Robber Is Held to October Grand Jury

At the North Chicago police station, Bruce Morse, 27, 2106 Kristan avenue, North Chicago, Saturday expressed his regret for having held up the Lake County State bank Friday morning in an effort to secure money to provide for his family and dispose of bill collectors for once and for all time, according to the Waukegan Times.

The robber waived a preliminary hearing before Police Magistrate J. B. Neahaus and was placed under bonds of \$5,000. He was later to be taken to the county jail to await trial before the October grand jury.

J. A. Newell, inspector of the Illinois Bankers' Federation, was in North Chicago investigating the case and it is believed that those who aided in catching Morse are to be given a reward.

Morse walked into the bank Friday morning at 9:45 o'clock and placed a note in front of Miss Elsie Streed, assistant cashier, demanding that she turn over \$500 in \$20 bills to him under threat of death. The note stated that he had a bomb under his arm which he would drop to the floor if she gave any signal.

Miss Streed tossed him the money and as he started to walk out pressed the burglar alarm. So did Miss Moneta Jones, who was at the next window.

Morse made his escape to his waiting car but was later caught and identified as the robber by two bank guards and three women. Those who actually caught him were:

Mrs. Catherine Jeffers, Miss Elsie Streed, Miss Moneta Jones, Edward Holmberg and Al Childers.

After considerable grilling he finally confessed and disclosed the money, which he had hidden in his shoe.

His wife, Evelyn, and children are to be adequately cared for by the county, it was stated at the North Chicago police station.
