Most of these performances are late Saturday or Sunday afternoon affairs, and take place in a cool and shady garden.

The one booked for Highland Park will be presented Sunday, August 3 in the garden of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Beatty, 260 Ravine drive, at 4 o'clock under the auspices of the Highland Park League of Women Voters. This lovely spot, which Mrs. Lazareff director of the Chicago Art theatre says reminds her of European gardens, lends itself beautifully to this type of play. Tickets may be secured there the afternoon of the performance, at Pease Drug Store or at the Moraine hotel.
