

Postmaster Says No Political Influence in Lease of Building

Joseph Przyborski, North Chicago postmaster, and Hugo Schneider, postmaster at Highland Park, declared that, to their knowledge, there was "no political influence used in awarding of postoffice leases in their communities, according to the Waukegan Times.

"Bids in North Chicago were duly advertised for and federal postoffice inspector visited all cities concerned," Mr. Przyborski stated. "I think there is some mistake about North Chicago being included in the list of postoffices to be investigated by Senator Blaine and his committee."

Mr. Schneider was equally emphatic in declaring that there had been no political influence exerted in the Highland Park selection. He has heard no objection to the lease from Highland Park citizens, he said.

The senate investigating committee is said to have received its reports of political discrimination in answer to questionnaires sent to owners of property in territory adjacent to the rented postoffice buildings in several hundred communities.

Postmaster Announces Extension of Delivery Names Sections Affected

Postmaster Hugo L. Schneider has received a letter from Washington granting the extension of mail delivery to the following points:

All of Deerfield road to the west limits of Highland Park.

Deerfield avenue to number 900. To the following streets in the Highland Park Gardens subdivision: Ferndale, Cavell, Glenwood, Eastwood, to Midland, and to the extreme south, County Line road, Valley road inclusive.

The conditions are: Houses must be numbered, mail receptacles must be placed within 50 feet of lot line, at the front door, if house is within this distance. This service will begin on August 11, 1930, one morning delivery each day. Patrons living within this territory will file application for delivery at the Highland Park Post Office before the date mentioned.

Scientific Methods

All instruction in this school is based upon the scientific method of the famous Moscow Art theatre, of which Ivan Lazaraff was for 20 years a valued and highly respected member. Since his death, his wife, Maria Astrova Lazareff, has carried forward his plans. The method of approach to acting and directing is motivated by purely artistic considerations which regard the theatre as a serious contribution to the spiritual and intellectual life of the community, rather than as a form of light amusement. Ivan Lazareff defined the theatre as, "The life of a human spirit on the stage," and explained that the aim of the school is to develop both an "inner" and an "outer" technique for the actor so that he may know his soul as well as his body, and rely upon his own resources rather than upon old fixed forms.

Virginia Dale, dramatic critic of the Chicago Journal has written of the Art theatre: "The work of the Chicago Art theatre makes evident the very thing for which the Moscow Art theatre was admired—imagination, resourcefulness, and an engaging naturalness—I have never seen anywhere a less self-conscious group—Like the Moscow Art theatre, the Lazareff players preserve and augment the value of the lines of the play by keeping in character, and their silences are filled with meaning."

Arrest Highwood Man in Burning of Home

James Woods, 78 year old retired soldier of 321 Highwood avenue, Highwood, was arrested shortly after noon Saturday by State Fire Marshal Paul E. Bertram of Crystal lake following an investigation into the burning Saturday morning of Woods' home. Woods, believed to be insane, is charged with arson, and was to be given an insanity hearing Tuesday, according to the Waukegan News-Sun, which says:

Woods left his home at 9 o'clock Saturday morning, locking all doors. 30 minutes later, the building burst into flames, the fire almost destroying the house before firemen could extinguish it. The entire interior of the building was gutted by the flames, and the loss will exceed \$1,500.

Highwood police and fire officials, making an investigation in to the probable cause of the blaze, called Fire Marshal Bertram, who inspected the ruins at noon. The arrest of Woods followed.

Police pointed out that several fires have been started in the building recently, but were put out by Woods without the aid of firemen. Woods, believed to be a pyromaniac, has been under observation of police for six months.
