LIBRARY TO OCCUPY OLD CITY BUILDING

Permission by Council Given Under Certain Conditions; Other Session Details

At its regular session Monday evening the city council granted the H. P. public library use of the old city hall building for one year while the new library building is being erected.

The library board was given permission to occupy the building on the corner of Central and Green Bay with the understanding that it be turned back to the city in the same condition as obtains at the present time. The agreement is subject to the sale of the building by the city, in which event the permit to the library may be revoked on 90 days' notice, according to the action of the council.

Tax Levy Ordinance

The annual tax levy ordinance was presented and placed on file for public inspection, as required by law. It carries a total of \$311,207.50, the amount to be levied by city tax for the ensuing year.

Acting Mayor Reay appointed and the council approved a mosquito abatement commission to be composed of the following members: Carl A. Peterson, chairman; Robert W. Larke, Gordon Buchanan, John L. Mitchell and Earl R. Jerome.

Talk on National Air Races at Chamber of Commerce August 12th

With the National Air Races at Curtiss Field, near Glenview, scheduled for the latter part of this month, the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce has planned a special program at its August meeting, Tuesday evening, Aug. 12, at 6:30, at the Green Tea Pot, where the usual fine dinner will be served.

A feature of the program will be a talk by R. W. Ibenfeldt, president of the Junior Association of Commerce and the speakers' bureau of the National Air Races. Mr. Ibenfeldt will describe that colorful panorama of aviation to be staged at Curtiss Field August 23 to September 1, a feature of which will be an All-Illinois Day, on Sunday, August 24, intended to stimulate interest among all chambers of commerce in the state in the great national air spectacle. The speaker will outline the scope of the air pageant, with special emphasis on the elaborate preparations being made for All-Illinois Day.

All members of the chamber are urged to be present at the dinner and meeting Tuesday evening, Aug. 12, as this program will be especially interesting. The National Air Races the great annual aeronautical assembly of the year will bring to Chicago and Curtiss Field the nation's greatest aviators, stunt fliers and the pick of the army and navy ships and pilots. The big navy dirigible, Los Angeles, is scheduled to visit the field, and hundreds of contests and spectacular achievements of army and navy contingents and famous commercial aviators will comprise a program hitherto unequalled in aviation history, it is predicted by those familiar with the plans.
