

EXTENSIVE BUILDING PROJECT IN SIGHT

Northmoor Club Plans \$350,000 Expenditure; Public Library; North Shore Trust

With prospects for the launching this fall of extensive building improvements to entail an aggregate of approximately \$500,000 to \$600,000 expenditure in three large improvements, as well as a number of smaller contracts, Highland Park in all probability will set a new mark for the north shore in the building line, refuting, as far as this community is concerned, help to reduce materially the unemployment figures in the Chicago region in connection with this industry.

Of the three proposed extensive improvements mentioned the largest is the projected new clubhouse and other large improvements at Northmoor club with a probable total expenditure of about \$350,000. Plans are not perfected, but there is assurance that this will be one of the biggest contracts of the autumn season, as it is expected to have everything ready for the beginning of operations some time this fall. Further details will be available later.

New Public Library

The new public library building, for which contracts will be awarded in a few days, it is expected, will cost when completed in the neighborhood (Continued on page 28)
