EXTENSIVE BUILDING PROJECT IN SIGHT

Northmoor Club Plans \$350,000 Expenditure; Public Library; North Shore Trust

With prospects for the launching this fall, of extensive building improvements to entail an aggregate of approximately \$500,000 to \$600,-000 expenditure in three large improvements, as well as a number of smaller constracts, Highland Park in all probability will set a new mark for the north shore in the building line, refuting, as far as this community is concerned, help to reduce materially the unemployment figures in the Chicago region in connection with this industry.
