

TIFFANY TALKS AT H. P. ROTARY SESSION

Lake Forest Chief of Police and
Rep. Nominee for Sheriff
Is Club's Guest

The Highland Park Rotary club, at its weekly luncheon at the Moraine hotel, Monday noon, had as its guest speaker, Chief of Police Lester Tiffany of Lake Forest, republican nominee for sheriff of Lake county, at the general election next November.

Chief Tiffany in a brief speech outlined some of the plans which he purposes to follow if he is elected sheriff which showed his foresight and executive ability. He also gave a review of his administration of the police department at Lake Forest, which is now one of the best managed, best officered and best equipped departments in the Chicago suburban region.

Compliments Police Dept.

In discussing police work, Chief Tiffany paid a high compliment to the excellence of the Highland Park police department and its able chief, Edward Moroney, stating that he had always found the local police prompt and efficient in all matters which he had had occasion to take up with them. He expressed the opinion that Highland Park and Lake Forest now have without question the finest police departments on the north shore, with the best equipment and officered by as fine a lot of men as may be found on police duty anywhere. He especially complimented the Highland Park department on its splendid per-

Widening of Bloom Street Viaduct Is Nearing Completion

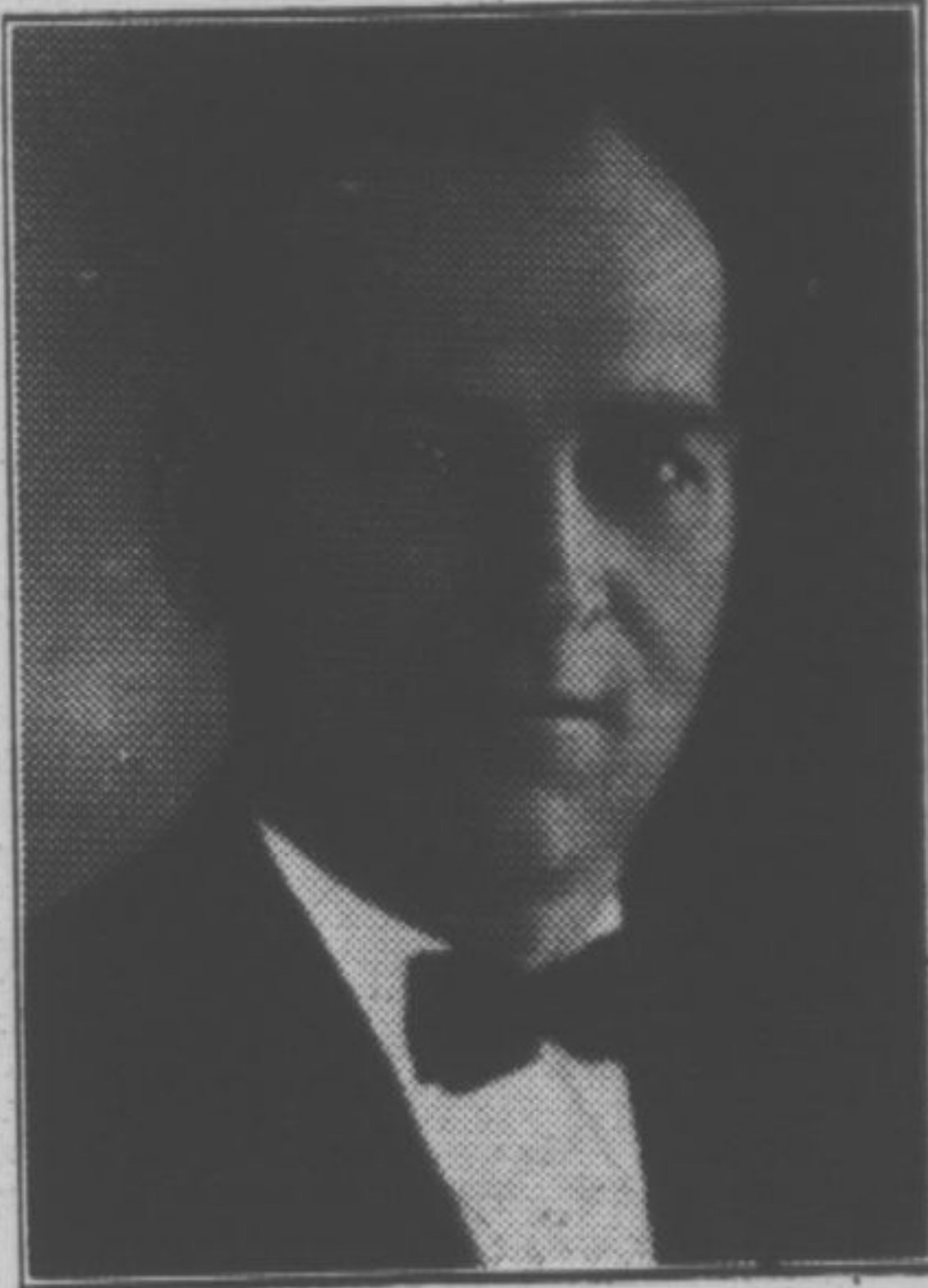
The Bloom street viaduct is being put in shape for traffic by city workmen. Recently the Northwestern railroad erected a new wall thereby widening the passage way materially, and under the agreement with the railroad the city is to pave the street through the arch. This work will be started this week, it is expected. In the meantime the old stone wall marking the former north boundary of the viaduct has been removed.

The roadway through the viaduct at Green Bay and Vine street is being repaved.

Edwards Denies Deal with Dady in Matter of Circuit Judgeship

Claire C. Edwards, former circuit judge, in a formal statement made last week, denied that he had made a "deal" to become master-in-chancery in case Ralph J. Dady is elected circuit judge and furthermore that he would not accept the position if offered.

Judge Edwards' statement, as published in the Waukegan Times, follows:

"It has been called to my attention that statements have been and are being made to members of the Lake County Republican Central Committee to the effect that my resignation as Circuit Judge was the result of a "deal" whereby I was to be appointed master-in-chancery in case Ralph J. Dady was elected circuit judge.

"At the time I announced my resignation; I gave the reason and the only reason, to-wit: That I had served the public for nearly sixteen years as circuit judge and could afford to do so no longer on the present salary. That was and is the sole and only reason for my leaving the bench.

"I made no deal, I have no promise from Mr. Dady, I am not a candidate for any office, I am not an applicant for the position of master-in-chancery and will not accept same under any circumstances. I am writing this that you may know the facts surrounding my resignation.

"I am supporting Mr. Dady not for any personal advantage or gain, but because I believe him well qualified for the position."

Library to Move Into Old City Building in Few Days; Arrangements

The Highland Park Public Library will move within the next few days to a temporary location in the old city hall.

The children's room will occupy the old council room and all branches of the work will go on as heretofore.

By slight rearrangement the building has been adapted to the library needs and the committee feels very fortunate to find so adequate a home in the city hall, until the completion of the new building next summer.
