The beet sugar and cane sugar industry is one of considerable importance in the United States, furnishing employment to thousands of farmers and wage-earners at wages far above The original marathon foot races those prevailing in Cuba. It is not took place in the days of the ancient desirable that we should be dependent entirely on foreign sources for sugar. Because of the great overproduction in Cuba the competition from this source has become such that the American sugar industry could scarcely survive long competition under existing conditions. For that reason a slight increase in the tariff was deemed necessary.

> Cuba has a preference of 20 per cent in the tariff over other sugar exporting nations, so that all our needs for sugar above the amount of domestic production is bought from that quarter. Because of our large purchases of sugar and other commodities in Cuba their is a large balance of trade against us in our Cuban transactions. Hence it cannot be claimed that we are dealing unfairly with Cuba in making a slight increase in the tariff. The new tariff has been in effect for some weeks, and sugar is still cheaper than we have ever known it.

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
