for the afternoon of August 14, is equally intriguing, the entertainment on that day being "The North Shore Varieties" a veritable revue in which all of the North Shore towns will be represented.

**Eighth Week**

The eighth week of the current Ravinia season will begin Sunday afternoon, August 10, with an orchestra concert which is designated as "An Afternoon of Bohemian Music and Composers." This forms a part of the national concert series which has become an established custom at Ravinia and will be dedicated to the Bohemian Arts club. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra will be under the direction of Eric DeLamarter, and John Weicher, violinist and Vaclav Jiskra, contra-bass, will be the soloists. Both of these artists, in addition to being prominent members of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, are likewise members of the Bohemian Arts club.

The program which Mr. DeLamarter has arranged for this occasion includes the overture to "Libussa" by Smetana, the tone poem "Vysehrad" by the same composer, the "Intermezzo" of Suk, Dvorak's "Scherzo" and "The Slavonic Dances" also by Dvorak. Mr. Weicher will present as his solo group "Slavonic Dance in A major," "Slavonic Dance in E minor," both by Dvorak, and "Skocna" by Smetana. Mr. Jiskra will play Kuchynka's "Fantasia for Contra-Bass." The honor guest at this con-

cert will be Vice-Consul Ladislav Uralan, who will make an address of welcome on behalf of the Bohemian Arts club. All seats are free for these Sunday afternoon concerts, the general admission at the gate covering everything.

Sunday night, August 10, Puccini's "Madame Butterfly" will be the operatic offering, Mme. Elisabeth Rethberg singing the title role. Although this is a repeat performance of this beloved Puccini work, there will be an important change of cast, Giovanni Martinelli assuming the role of Lieut. Pinkerton. Others in the cast are Mme. Bourskaya who will sing the role of Suzuki; Mario Basiola, who will be Sharpless; Lodovico Oliviero, Giuseppe Cavadore, George Cehanovsky, Philine Falco and Paolo Ananian. Gennaro Papi will conduct.

**Good News**

There is good news in the announcement that "Anima Allegra," the Vitadini opera which made such a sensational impression when it was given its initial Ravinia performance recently, and which scored equal success when it was given again within the same week, will be presented for the third time on Monday night, August 11. Seldom is a more colorful opera brought to performance, and as Consuelo, the lively heroine of this work, Mme. Lucrezia Bori adds another unusual role to her repertoire. The same cast previously heard in "Anima Allegra" will appear on Monday night, August 11, which means that Mario Chamlee will be opposite Mme. Bori in the role of Pedro, that Marek Windheim will be heard as Lucio, that Miss Florence Macbeth will be Coralito and Mme. Bourskaya will be cast as Donna Sacramento. Vittorio Trevisan will again be Don Eligio. Others in the cast are Lola Monti-Gorsej, Ada Paggi, Philine Falco, Lodovico Oliviero, George Cehanovsky, Giuseppe Cavadore and Paola Ananian. The ballet, which is a feature of the gypsy scene, will be headed by Ruth Page and Blake Scott. Gennaro Papi will conduct.

**"Faust" August 12**

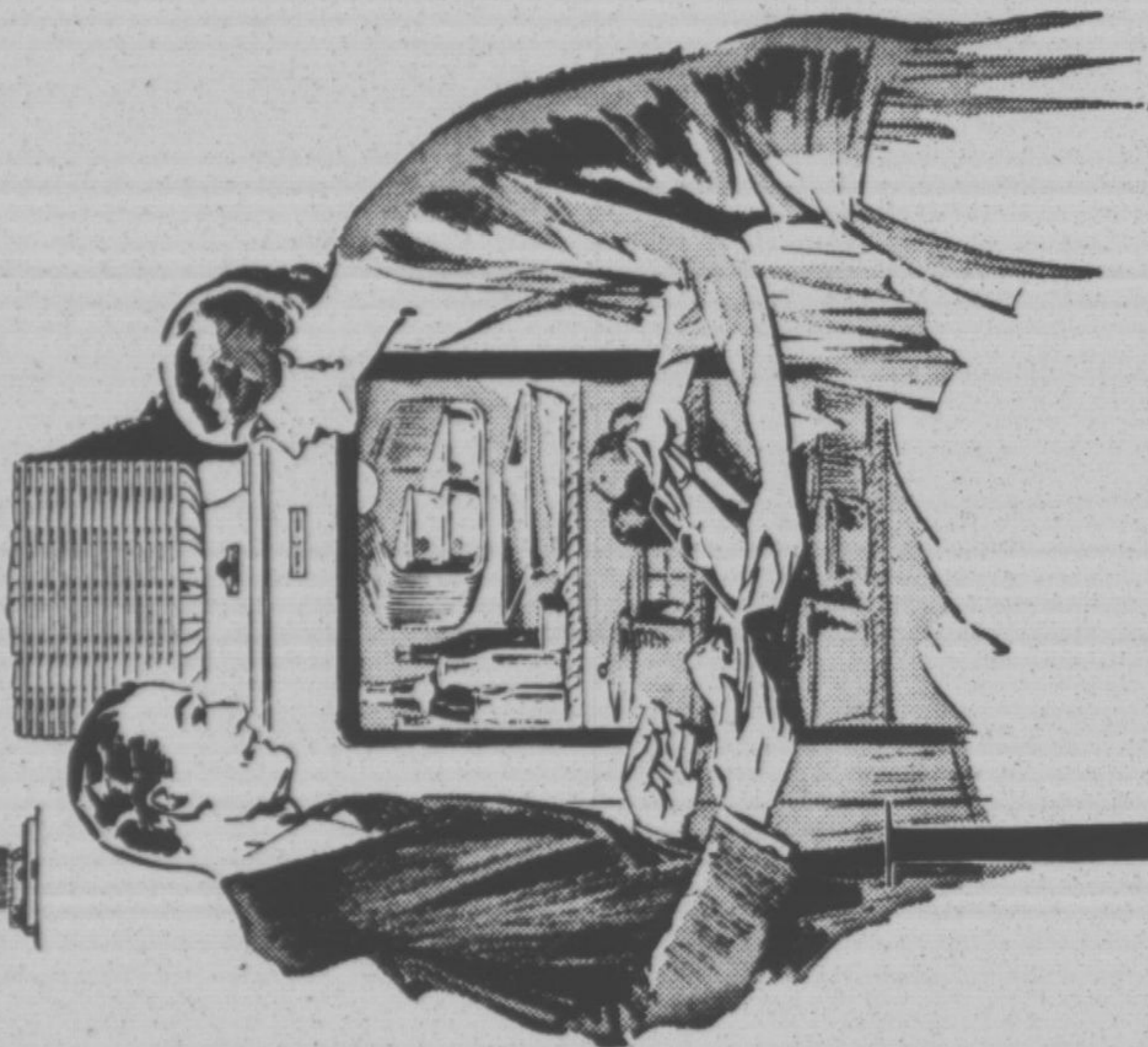
"Faust" will be presented on Tuesday night, August 12, this being one of the standard works which is always sure of a cordial reception at the hands of the public. It is replete in superb music that is well known, for its arias have long been considered as worthy of prominent place among the high spots of operatic literature. Mme. Yvonne Gall will be cast as Marguerite, one of her outstanding roles in which she has won tremendous success. Edward Johnson will have the role of Faust, which is perfectly suited to him both vocally and histrionically. Leon Rothier, suave, polished, a perfect exponent of the French school of acting and singing, will be Mephisto. Giuseppe Danise will this time be cast as Valentine, one of opera's great baritone roles. Others in the cast are Miss Paggi, Miss Falco and Mr. Ananian. Mr. Hasselmann will conduct.

Ravinia's great double bill of "Cavalleria Rusticana" and "Pagliacci" which always brings a record attendance, will be the offering on Wednesday night, August 13. In "Cavalleria Rusticana," Mme. Elisabeth Rethberg will be cast as Santuzza, which has been one of her greatest roles ever since it was added to her repertoire some years ago. Mario Chamlee will this time be opposite her as Turridu, which is a splendid role for this popular tenor. Mario Basiola will have the role of Alfio, Ada Paggi will be Lola and Philine Falco, Mama Lucia. In "Pagliacci," Queena Mario will be heard as Nedda, in which she has scored splendid success on many occasions, while Giovanni Martinelli will be opposite her in one of his most powerful roles, that of the wronged husband, Canio. Giuseppe Danise is to have the part of Tonio and will, of course, sing the "Prologue." George Cehanovsky will be Silvio and Lodovico Oliviero will be Beppe. Gennaro Papi will conduct both operas.
