The 22 men working have located and destroyed 5235 escaped common barberry during this period. Most of these harmful bushes have been found growing wild in the woods of Warren township, northwest of Gurnee, Government Agent Lester Davis reports. They are not to be confused with the ornamental type of barberry used in landscaping es-
