War Being Waged on Common Barberry Shrub

During the past three weeks the federal and state departments of agriculture have been waging war against the common barberry in Lake county. The 22 men working have located and destroyed 5235 escaped common barberry during this period. Most of these harmful bushes have been found growing wild in the woods of Warren township, northwest of Gurnee, Government Agent Lester Davis reports. They are not to be confused with the ornamental type of barberry used in landscaping estates.

Common barberry spreads the black stem rust and is harmful. A permanent exhibit has been set up at the Lake county farm bureau office, and also on the picnic grounds of the model farm near Mundelein. Other temporary exhibits will be placed in the various towns of the county this week. These bushes are set up in public places to that citizens of the county may become acquainted with the common barberry.
