

Attorney GEO. W FIELD

Circuit Judge
of the
17th Judicial
District

It is but a short time before a candidate for the office of Circuit Judge will be presented for the consideration of the voters at a special election to be held, probably, on November 4th next.

There are only two persons seriously mentioned for the place, namely: George W. Field and Ralph J. Dady, both of Waukegan, and both of whom are well known lawyers. Both have been practicing at this bar for slightly less than twenty-five years. Mr. Field had had about ten years active practice before coming to Lake county. Before reaching here, Mr. Field had lived all his life, except two years, in and within the borders of the Seventeenth Judicial District of Illinois, which is the district in which he hopes to become Judge. He began with his practice of the law in McHenry county, where for five years he was Master in Chancery, which position he resigned to become a member of the Board of Pension Appeals at Washington, D. C., being appointed thereto by President Theodore Roosevelt. After two years on that Board, from which he resigned, he returned to Woodstock, Illinois, remained there about one year, and came to Waukegan in 1907, where he has since resided.

Mr. Field served in the Illinois National Guard as Captain of Company "G," 3rd I. N. G. for four years, during which time the present Judge Fisher of our Circuit Court was his colonel.

In his practice he has uniformly defended the rights of the people, having appeared in a great many important cases in our local courts and in Chicago, and is now and has been attorney for the taxpayers of Waukegan. He has never sought political notice and has never held any office anywhere since 1905.

He has always been a Republican in Politics.

In his campaign for this most important office, he is receiving the active support of the labor organizations.

The nomination will be made by the Lake County Central Committee. It is understood that the other counties in this Judicial district will accept the Lake County nomination.

Mr. Field is peculiarly fitted for this office because of the varied character of his practice. He has a profound knowledge of criminal procedure, is recognized as an authority on chancery matters and his reputation as a trial lawyer is widely known, and is second to few.

Those who desire a fair and fearless man upon the bench where their most important interests may be the subject of judicial consideration at almost any time, will make no mistake in giving to Mr. Field their hearty support.
