George B. Hart Estate Exceeds Half-Million

An estate of nearly \$500,000 left by George B. Hart of Highland Park, who died December 21, 1929, is to be shared by his widow and two children, according to report filed with the county clerk today by Miss Marie Griffith, the appraiser.

Mrs. Florence Jenkins Hart is to receive \$237,884.69 of the estate and the children, Jane Jenkins Hart and James Abner Hart, are each to get \$114,855.65. The inheritance tax due is \$14,656.72.

Plan Future Trading in Citrus Fruits, Etc.

Future trading in citrus fruits may be the next development on the Chicago Mercantile exchange if recent conversations with Gov. Doyle E. Carlton of Florida materialize, the Chicago Association of Commerce announces. "Florida fruit growers and shippers are studying modern marketing methods," Gov. Carlton told exchange directors, "and if you can submit a practicable method of trading for future delivery in oranges and grapefruit we shall cordially welcome it."
