Full description of the new library was given in the Press several weeks ago, accompanied by a picture of the architects' drawing on the cover page. The architects are Holmes & Flynn.

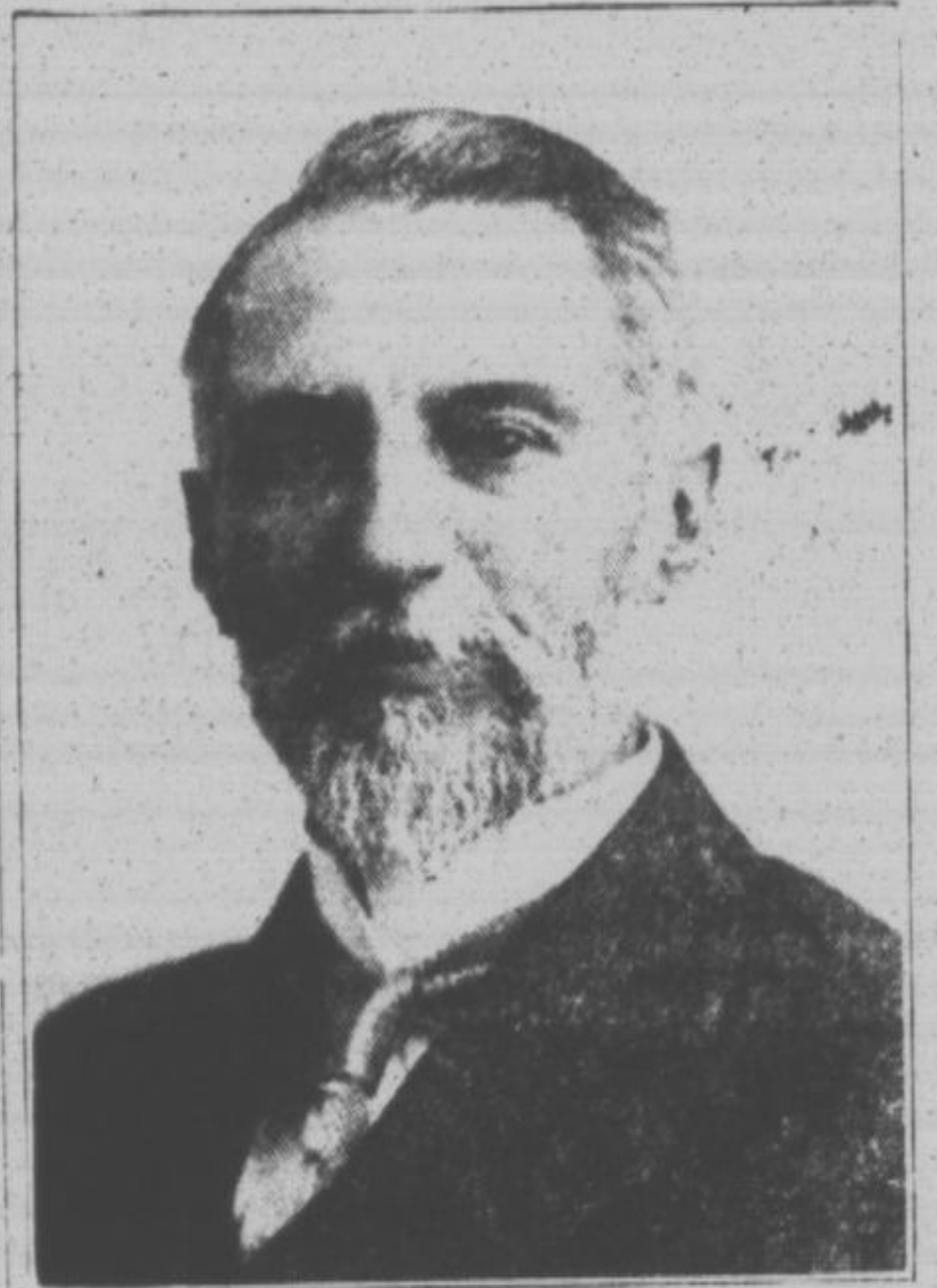
