Excerpts from Speech

"Since the advent of the service of women upon the jury, I firmly believe that the woman juror has improved the atmosphere of the court. Women are getting a new outlook upon life, a view into business complications of the commercial world. A few weeks of jury service is a great education both for the average man and woman, and this respite from the drudgery of household tasks makes her a broader-minded and a better citizen. She brings to the jury box a new point of view.

"The greatest bulwarks of society are the homes, the schools, and the courts. In two of these, woman plays (Continued on page 33)
