

MOCK TRIAL FEATURE OF LEGION COUNCIL

W. T. Copithorne Defendant in Amusing Burlesque; Session at Lake Forest

One of the outstanding features of the monthly session of Lake County council of the American Legion at Lake Forest last Friday evening was a mock trial in which W. T. Copithorne was defendant on a charge of expending the enormous sum of \$2.75 in connection with his election as a delegate to the state convention of the Legion at Aurora in September.

It was shown that "Mickey," knowing he would be absent at the time of the local post meeting at which the election would take place, had written several of his friends regarding the matter, but the cause of the mock trial was the fact that he had paid collect charges on a telegram from members of the post sent after the election to LaPorte, Ind., where he was on a vacation, notifying him of his election.
