

**Excessive Charges in Pryzborski Case Cause Hospital Head's Arrest**

Officials of the state department of registration and education are prepared to press charges against Robert E. Parks, manager of the Des Plaines emergency hospital, who was arrested Saturday on a charge of violating the state medical practice laws, according to a story in the Waukegan Times, which says:

"Mrs. Marie Przyborski, wife of Attorney Max Przyborski, of North Chicago, died in this hospital two weeks ago after a serious accident for which an enormous charge was made of William Dalziel, president of the Lake County State bank of North Chicago, who handled the business for Mr. Przyborski after the tragedy. In settling the bill Mr. Dalziel paid \$618 and then the next day when he brought Mr. Przyborski to Waukegan he was charged with \$65 which included the keeping of two motorcycle policemen sent there to serve warrants that were never served, it is reported.

"Parks, who has been in similar trouble before, was arrested at the Des Plaines hospital by Alfred Mitchell, police chief of La Grange Park, on a warrant sworn out by Inspector Charles Storey of the department of registration.

"He was taken before Justice of the Peace James L. Henry Saturday night and released on \$200 bond. Friday, August 22, was set as the date for the preliminary hearing in La Grange Park.

"Attention was turned to Parks following the deaths of three victims of automobile accidents during the last three weeks.

"Among these have been 'Paddy' Harmon, sports promoter; Mrs. Marie Przyborski and Murray MacLeod, banker on the northwest side.

**George L. Shuman Dies Funeral Last Monday**

George L. Shuman, a Chicago publisher, died last Friday night at his home, 153 Michigan avenue, following prolonged illness. He was aged 63 years, ten months and ten days. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Hattie H. Shuman, and one son, John R. Shuman. The funeral was held Monday morning at Rosehill chapel, and interment was in the Rosehill cemetery. The family has the sincere sympathy of their many friends in this community.

**Report Arrests Break Up Thefts by Alleged Gang at Fort Sheridan**

Break-up of an alleged gang of soldiers who have been stealing food from the army quartermaster's department is believed accomplished with the arrest of four army men and one civilian at Fort Sheridan it was announced late last week by Lieutenant Hobart D. Reed, post provost marshal, according to the Waukegan Times.

Persistent thefts over a period of many months from this department are believed cleared up by the arrests. The men were caught taking about \$50 worth of foodstuffs, the provost marshal stated.

Samuel De Franzen, 32, of Highwood is the civilian involved, and is said to have admitted to army officials that he from time to time purchased the stolen supplies, the Waukegan paper states.

Sergeant Walter G. Seyk and Private Edward Ryan are two of the soldiers involved, while the names of the other two men under arrest have not been made public. The men were held in the guardhouse.

It is expected that the total thefts from the department will total several thousand dollars, it is admitted at the marshal's office.

The case is still under investigation, and court martials will not be held until all angles are cleared up. De Franzen is to be turned over to county officers and prosecuted on a charge of receiving stolen property, Lieutenant Reed intimated.

Stern justice is given any enlisted man who is caught stealing government supplies, the penalties ranging from long guardhouse terms to sentences in federal prisons.

Civilians involved in such cases face prosecution in either county or federal courts, probably in the state courts, although it is possible that De Franzen may be tried in federal court in Chicago.

**Garage and Car Are Destroyed by Fire**

An old wooden garage on the Shehen property, in the rear of 595 Central avenue, burned about 1 o'clock Monday morning, and a used car belonging to a man named Stewart also was destroyed. The flames had gained great headway when the blaze was discovered, and about all that the firemen could do was to prevent spread of the fire to adjacent buildings.
