Business Meeting

George Alexander McKinlock Jr. Post, No. 264, was host to the regular monthly session of the Council on Friday, August 15. The meeting was opened by Matt Porter as commander of the post, and turned over to District Commander Charles C. Kapschull. Owing to the illness of County Adjutant, Rawson Bowden of Highland Park, Clarence Huhn of Deerfield post was appointed acting adjutant.

One of the first speakers of the evening was Mancel Talcott, chef de gare of Lake county's voiture of the "40 and 8" the fun making department of the Legion. He announced that lots of fun is in store for the coming year and that the "box car" recently completed would be at county convention and at Aurora during the state convention in September. He also stated that the Lake county voiture was second largest in the state.

Monty Rasmussen, in his report, recommended the compiling and publishing of all laws of state and federal governments, wherein veterans received benefits. This he said could be sold to individuals at a nominal charge to cover cost of publication. He talked at length on the faults of the much-touted Johnson Bill and pointed out that but a comparative few would benefit by it.

Good Work Praised

Brad West came in for a shower of praise from Henry Rhode, Monty Rasmussen and County Commander Kapschull for the good work done in Lake county under the Bogardus act. Rhode says he believes that West's work ranks highest in the state.

Mancel Talcott as state graves registration officer, reported that the plan developed for use in Lake county would in all probability be adopted

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by state and national headquarters as the model form.

Bob Gullic of North Chicago gave a lengthy report of the hospital relations work, citing many organizations for their aid and going into detail in many cases.

Mr. Carpenter, newly elected commander of Sharvin post, gave an interesting account of the boy scout activities of the Legion. He mentioned Rex Bensen of Antioch, Len Hook of Grays Lake, M. C. Rybolt of Highland Park, Warren Blodgett of Waukegan as being most active in this line of endeavor.

Athletics

Archie Maplethorpe of Antioch, county athletic officer, recommended the continuation of Legion athletics in the form of basketball and indoor ball teams whenever such a program did not conflict with school plans. This suggestion was accepted and principals of schools are to be interviewed on the feasibility of the plan.

Len Hook of Grays Lake gave his customary up-to-the-minute financial report.

Harry Brown of Lake Forest presented a resolution (adopted by the council) petitioning action for an appropriation to pave Sheridan road through Fort Sheridan. Henry Rhode in seconding this move, stated that by actual count, an average of 53 cars per hour used this section of the state highway.

Failure of the Lake Bluff board to accept children from U. S. Veterans hospital No. 105 into schools as pupils was given considerable time and discussion. It was brought out that the children had been at one time admitted, paid tuition, then rejected; no one seemed to know just why this situation existed. Howard Garnant of Great Lakes post stated that children at Great Lakes had had the same experience and that parents had banded together to hire two teachers under the supervision of Supt. Simpson, to teach school in Great Lakes. "Hank" Foval of Lake Bluff said that as far as he knew a bus had been or was available to haul children to and from Great Lakes. Action was taken on the matter in the form of a letter requesting information from the Lake Bluff school board.

Other Matters

One result of the pilgrimage to the soldiers' orphans home at Normal was recommendation of the establishment of vocational training courses at the home, by means of which the children may assure themselves of a livelihood upon leaving.

Marshall Pottenger of Deerfield discussed advertising in the Legionnaire to some extent with recommendations of its liberal patronage by members. Commander Kapschull recommended that each post assess itself three cents per member in order to buy stencils for the much-needed mailing list. Dan Hunt, the editor, spoke at length on his problems in getting out the paper and requested authority to solicit political advertising, which after much discussion, was ordered held up until after the state convention.

And then followed the accusation and trial of "Micky" Copithorne as reported in the opening paragraphs. The next meeting of the Council will be held at Great Lakes, September 19th.

St. James Wins 15-3 Over Des Plaines in Game Sunday

Air Mail Exhibit in Chicago Aug. 23-Sept. 1

During the National Air Races to be held at Chicago August 23 to September 1, inclusive, the Post Office department will have an air mail exhibit in the Allerton house, at 701 North Michigan boulevard, Chicago.

The Allerton house has been designated as the headquarters of Air Mail pilots by the National Air Race association, and the exhibit will be open to the public free of charge. This exhibit will be conducted on an educational basis and postal attendants will be available to explain the operation of the air mail service from a business standpoint.

In addition to the air mail exhibit, there will also be a general aviation exhibit including air passenger traffic, beacon lights, flood lights, airways, etc.

Things to Cook

Among the many vegetables which we enjoy and which should be included in our daily menus, there is nothing more popular than corn cooked on the cob. To bring out the best flavor and make it most tender, corn should be placed in rapidly boiling water and cooked not more than ten minutes, sometimes less.

When corn is left over, a good way to use it is to bake it with sweet potatoes, cutting it carefully from the cob. Instead of using cooked corn, the uncooked corn may be scraped from the cob and used, or when new corn is not in season, canned corn may be used.

Corn Baked with Sweet Potatoes

- 2 cups cooked sweet potatoes
- 2 cups corn—fresh or canned
- 3 tablespoons butter or other fat
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1½ cups milk
- 1½ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- ½ cup buttered crumbs
- Paprika.

Make a sauce of butter, flour, milk, salt and pepper. Place half of the potatoes in greased casserole, sprinkle with half the sugar, cover with sauce, then half the corn, with more sauce. Repeat, using all other half of all ingredients, with sauce on top. Sprinkle with crumbs and a dash of paprika and bake about one-half hour at 400. This makes an excellent luncheon dish or, for a dinner, it makes a very substantial meal accompanied by a meat, salad and dessert.
