

TAX LEVY ORDINANCE PASSED BY COUNCIL

Annual Measure Carrier Total of \$311,207.50; Other Business of the Session

The annual tax levy ordinance was passed on final reading at the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening. It carries a total of \$311,207.50, distributed among the several departments. The complete text of the ordinance appears elsewhere in this paper.
