The third floor of the National College of Education will be completed for the opening of the fall session, September 12, according to President Edna Dean Baker. Work has gone on rapidly during the summer and is nearing completion so that furniture and equipment may be installed.

In addition to class rooms, the third floor will include a general college library, children's library and pre-school library, science laboratory and domestic science suite, a small auditorium, art and music rooms and rest rooms for the students. The cafeteria, manual training shop, shower and locker rooms and dressing rooms in the basement are being completed at this time also, so that the fall term will open with greatly increased facilities for taking care of the college students and the children's school.

Registration of freshman students will be held on September 12 and 13, that of former students on the 15th and 16th and the opening assembly will be held on the 17th.
