

Mrs. Eddy's discovery was her awakening to the use of her spiritual senses, the letting of "this mind" be in her, "which was also in Christ Jesus." To her newly aroused spiritual senses, cause and effect were discerned as wholly mental. Mrs. Eddy's discovery carried her much farther than to "trace all physical effects to a mental cause." She could not escape the logical deduction that every effect reflects the nature of its cause. Beginning with a first cause or God, which is Spirit, Mind, she rightly deduced a universe or effect which is. like its creator, spiritually mental. A new sense of reality dawned upon
