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Little Boy Killed by Auto in Crossing Road to Pick Wild Flowers

A five-year-old boy who wanted to pick some flowers to take home with him to Chicago last week was killed as he started to cross Rand road, about two miles south of Lake Zurich, and was struck by a motorist.

The family was headed for Lake Zurich and as their automobile was traveling along Rand road the children noticed some flowers. Piper stopped his automobile on the side of the road and the family got out.

Little Edmund saw some flowers on the opposite side of the road that he wanted to pick. He left his mother and father and started to cross the road. Edmund got part of the way across when he was struck by an automobile owned by Dennis Naughton of Chicago, according to Deputies George Heckinger and Frank Suholodnik.

The little boy was put into an automobile and started for the hospital, but he died before the hospital was reached.
