Highland Park Man Rescues Three from Their Burning Ship

Out for an early morning sail in his sloop, the Blanca Flor, Walter Reed of 198 Edgecliffe drive, Highland Park, head of the Boy Scouts, accompanied by two Chicago friends, rescued three Chicagoans from a burning yacht just before the craft sank two miles off Oak street last Thursday.

One of the men saved was severely burned, however, when the 35-foot sloop, the Mildred II, caught fire and

Those rescued are Norman W. Blondell, 4517 North Lawndale avenue; his

The Blondells and Coyle set out for an early morning cruise on their boat, when the craft caught fire either from an exploding kerosene lamp or a lighted eigaret tossed by one of them in a cabin.

The flames spread rapidly through the cabin, and an explosion resulted when they reached the gasoline tank. The three men tried to check the blaze, and seeing that their efforts were futile, took to the dinghy and lowed away.

The Blanca Flora, another sloop, occupied by Reed, Jerry Masek of the Columbia Yacht club and Frank Hayes, 411 Fullerton parkway, sighted the burning ship when half a mile

They picked up the passengers and brought them ashore. Norman Blondell had been burned on the face and hands while trying to extinguish the fire, and was taken to a hospital for attention.

Reed is a Northwestern university graduate. In the four years he has been a sailor he has figured in several rescues. Last year he rescued four children and several adults from a disabled sailing vessel off Belmont harbor.
