## Morton J. Traub



Morton J. Traub, LaSalle street investment broker, who was wounded by the discharge of a shotgun at his home in Highland Park on September 8, died last night in the Highland Park hospital.

Mr. Traub told Dr. Karl Meyer, assistant warden of the Cook County hospital and a close friend, who attended him, that the wound was accidental and occurred when he slipped and fell as he was cleaning the gun preparatory to a hunting trip.

He was believed to have been recovering from his wound until a few days ago when an infection set in.

Mr. Traub is survived by his widow, a son, Morton Jr., 17 years old, and a daughter, Suzanne, 15 years old. He was 53 years old and was manager of the securities department of Prince & Whitely.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, at Trinity Episcopal church. Burial will be at Indianapolis.
