STATE BANK AIDING SCHOOL THRIFT PLAN

Affords Service of Clerk to Handle Savings of Children Deposited in Bank

Nearly all school children in Highland Park participate in the school saving or Thrift programs of the several-local schools, and the Highland Park State bank reports that it does considerable work in connection with the handling of these accounts, as it takes almost the entire time of one clerk to take care of them. This work is not a money making proposition, it is pointed out, as the bank cheerfully donates its services as an educational factor. Regarding the Thrift program in the schools of the Chicago suburbs the following is furnished:

School children in 50 of Chicago's suburbs, including Highland Park, carried their bank books to school and deposited their summer savings in the school savings bank on the first bank day of the new school year.

At the same time that their deposits are being checked by their fellow pupils acting as cashiers and tellers, they are receiving lessons in
