Building Inspector Points Out Unusual Condition; How Public May Aid

The following letter from Mr. Sidney D. Morris, city building inspector is timely and points out a condition that perhaps is not generally known to our readers. It also emphasizes the benefits of employing home labor in local work and the value of building now while this labor is easily obtainable. The letter, which is addressed to the Highland Park Press, under date of September 22, 1930, is as follows:

The Letter

An unusual condition exists, in that, with fairly good building activity going on in Highland Park a considerable number of our best citizens,carpenters, brick-layers and other mechanics are out of work. In some cases where there are children the situation is becoming acute. I believe that the building depression will soon be over but in the mean time it has occurred to me that those of us having garages to build, partitions or windows to change, roofs to shingle and other alterations to make, might do so now.
