League of Women Voters Secures Expression from Him; Woman Judge Is Quoted

The Highland Park League of Women Voters is asking a number of representative Highland Park citizens for expressions of opinion concerning women on juries. The following answer was recently received from Everett L. Millard:

"I favor the proposed amendment to the Illinois statute providing for the right of women legal voters to serve on juries. Women do not seem to differ from men in their degree of natural ability to pass on evidentiary values, and their lesser experience in some practical matters will perhaps be balanced by more conscientious attention than that of the average juror. If they have the right to vote it seems quite logical that they should have the right to sit on juries, and that they should have it as an important element in their growing interest and education in public matters."

URGES BENEFITS OF HIRING LOCAL LABOR

City Building Inspector Points Out Unusual Condition; How Public May Aid

The following letter from Mr. Sidney D. Morris, city building inspector is timely and points out a condition that perhaps is not generally known to our readers. It also emphasizes the benefits of employing home labor in local work and the value of building now while this labor is easily obtainable. The letter, which is addressed to the Highland Park Press, under date of September 22, 1930, is as follows:

The Letter

An unusual condition exists, in that, with fairly good building activity going on in Highland Park a considerable number of our best citizens,—carpenters, brick-layers and other mechanics are out of work. In some cases where there are children the situation is becoming acute. I believe that the building depression will soon be over but in the mean time it has occurred to me that those of us having garages to build, partitions or windows to change, roofs to shingle and other alterations to make, might do so now. In fact it would be a neighborly thing to do.
