### Funeral Held Monday for Christina Duffy

Funeral services for Miss Christina Duffy were held at the Holy Cross Catholic church Monday morning at 10 o'clock, the Rev. C. L. McDonough officiating.

Miss Duffy passed away early Friday morning, September 19, 1930. She was 78 years old and was born on a farm west of Deerfield on N. Wilmot road, commonly known as Duffy's lane, which her father bought in 1844.

She came from a family of 17 children, only three survive her, one brother Michael and two sisters Mrs. Kate Nolan of Chicago and Mrs. Ellen Knickerbocker of Deerfield.

Miss Duffy with her brother Michael lived on the farm until 1920 when they sold it and came to live with their sister, Mrs. Knickerbocker on Waukegan road.

While Miss Duffy had been ailing for a number of years, her death was rather sudden. During the past few years she sustained a number of injuries including a broken leg, fractured shoulder and arm, which confined her to her bed for many months.

Testimony of the high esteem in which she was held was widened by the large attendance at the obsequies.

She was buried in St. Patrick's cemetery West Lake Forest.

The grand nephews acted as pallbearers.
