## Work on Two Large New Structures Starts Here Building Boom Is Seen

Highland Park bids fair to lead the rest of the county in the volume of construction for the month of September. Permits issued for the first three weeks of this month, which include two large buildings, total \$349,600.

Work on the two structures is now under way and will be rushed to completion. One is the addition to the Northmoor Country club on Green Bay road to cost \$320,000 and the addition to the North Shore Trust company building to cost \$70,000.

Six residences, for a total of \$44,200, seven private garages to cost \$2,100, two remodeling permits and one for miscellaneous buildings were also issued by Mr. Morris.

Alfred Alschuler is architect for the Northmoor club building and C. E. Bakken the general contractor. Work has been started on the excavation and the building is expected to be completed early next spring. Joseph Michaels is president of the board of directors.

## STATE BANK AIDING SCHOOL THRIFT PLAN

arithmetic, language and geography which demonstrate some fact connected with saving, earning, spending and investing money.

This is part of the new nationwide educational movement which has put the study of thrift in the public schools. The 4,500,000 school children of the United States who were studying in the 15,500 schools in which thrift is part of the regular curriculum made deposits exceeding \$29,000,000 for the school year 1929-1930, according to figures supplied by Thrift, Inc., of Oak Park, sponsors of the school savings bank movement in the middle west.

### Total Savings Large

School children in the Chicago area from Aurora to Hammond and from Lake Forest to Wheaton have deposits to their credit amounting to \$794,187.09. The total amount in savings accounts of school children all over the country is in excess of \$50,000,000.

Under the present plan of operation the schools and banks work together in teaching thrift. Teachers, principals and superintendent explain the idea to children and parents, and the schools everywhere set aside a period each week for thrift study. Banks arrange for the collection of the money, supply pass books and all other literature and paraphernalia needed, and bear the expense of clerical work.

Some individual accounts of school children run into several thousand dollars and have been deposited with such definite objectives as college, education, travel, investment or entrance into business.

The Lake county convention of Religious Education will be held in Bethany Evangelical church, Highland Park, September 25. All Sunday school workers are urged to attend this convention.

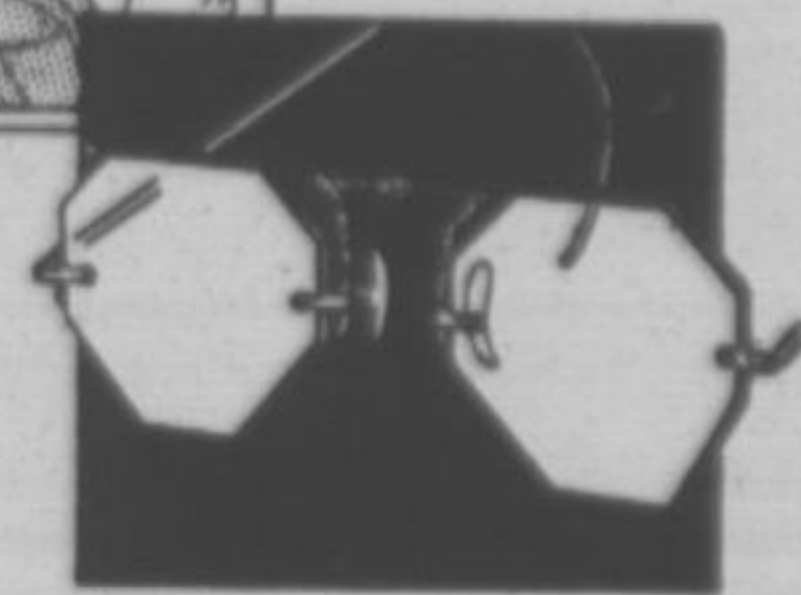
