### Children's Benefit Tag Day Is Monday

Monday, October 6 is the Annual Tag day of the Chicago Children's Benefit league, a group of 50 children's charities allowed to tag Chicago and suburbs once a year, definite locations being allotted to each charity. Highland Park, Braeside and Ravinia will be tagged in the business sections and at the railroad stations for the Illinois Children's Home and Aid society.

Mrs. H. H. Chandler has long been the Highland Park representative on the North Shore Advisory board which supports the Evanston Receiving Home of the society. This is not an orphanage, but a temporary home where a family of 45 neglected children can be cared for until they are ready for placement in family homes.

While the children are going to school, and learning how to live wholesome lives, a corps of trained social workers, advised by local doctors and leading psychiatrists, find homes best suited to each child. Over 150 different children coming from any part of the state live in the Receiving-Home each year.

This year the Women's club of Ravinia with Mrs. E. E. Leonard as chairman is managing the tagging. The captains are Mrs. Theo. Osborne, Mrs. H. A. Sallery, and Mrs. Allen Wolff.

At 3 o'clock on Friday, October 3, all of the taggers for the society are invited to a tea at the Evanston Receiving Home, on Ridge avenue, at Washington street, to hear Mr. C. V. Williams, superintendent of the society, and to see the children. In the absence of Mrs. Wheaton Augar president of the North Shore Advisory board, Mrs. J. F. Oates of Evanston is acting president.
