Supt. Gives Park Dist. Summary of Operations of Playgrounds, Beaches

In an exhaustive report to the president and commissioners of the Highland Park East Park district, E. M. Laing, superintendent of park activities gives interesting information regarding the popularity of the bathing beaches and dance activities included among the summer activities of the parks.
